

Racing Pigeons to Land In Roseburg

SEATTLE, Wash., April 14.—Seattle racing pigeons are being put in shape for the coming season's contests which include flights to Seattle from points as far south as San Francisco, 676 miles by air line. Between 150 and 200 birds will be entered in the flights by members of the Seattle Racing Pigeon club which has arranged a schedule for the summer.

A German war pigeon, captured in France, will be entered in some of the races by Ralph Norborn, Seattle, formerly a member of the Pigeon corps, United States army. Other members of the club believe the American birds will outfly the German air messenger.

Short distance races between the birds are generally the most hotly contested, the club officials say. Last year R. Day, a Seattle bird, set a record in flying 188 miles in three hours and 45 minutes, or 1467 yards per minute.

Many Land Filings Are Duplicated

About 25 per cent of the O. & C. grant land opened for entry has been filed on, according to figures given out today at the land office. In Jackson county the percentage has been surpassed and in Douglas county it has not quite been reached. The number of applications is diminishing now and the rush is over. Although many filings are being made they are scattering and the heavy work of the first two days is over insofar as the land office is concerned.

It is stated that there has been considerable duplication. Soldiers are given the period from April 12 to May 8 to file on lands. After that time a drawing is held to settle cases in which there are duplications. After this drawing all additional filings will take precedence by the order of filing, however, those now being made are classed as being simultaneous on May 8, and all men filing between now and that time have equal rights.

It is expected that additional legislation will be needed to dispose of the larger portion of the land. There is a large amount worth but little for grazing, farming or for its timber and is of practically no value. It is quite probable that congress will adopt some method of disposing of this land after an opportunity has been given all those who desire to find homesteads.

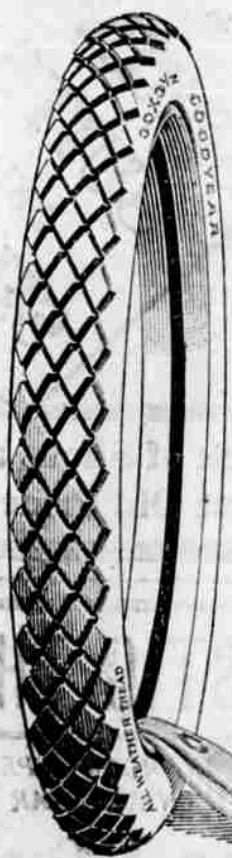
