Students Here Average High

A communication was this morning received by Supt. A. G. Smith in regard to the Briggs standard tests, which were recently held in the schools here. These tests were general all over the United States, and for the purpose of ascertaining the average intelligence along those lines of children of a certain age and grade. The communication gave the standard now in existence and also the attainments of the Roseburg pupils which in every case but one, is above the standard. Accompanying the communication is a commendatory note from F. L. Stetson, who is at present at Columbia university, in New York, as a student, and who is assisting Prof. Briggs, of Columbia, in this standardization work. Mr. Stetson was formerly principal in the department of education at the university of Oregon and an old friend of Supt. Smith. The communication from Prof. Briggs, and the grades attained compared with the average are as follows:

ALBANY SCHOOL BOARD ADOPTS NEW SCHEDULE.

ALBANY, Or., April 13.—The Albany school board has adopted a tentative schedule for teachers' salaries during the next school year. In the high school the minimum is \$120 per month and the maximum \$125; in the junior high school the salaries will range from \$110 to \$115, and grade teachers in the other schools will be paid a minimum of \$100 and a maximum of \$107.50.

This new schedule is dependent upon the millage tax or, in the event

the measure fails to become a law, upon the voting of a higher budget in the local district through special taxation.
