TEACHERS PROTEST SALARY SCHEDULE

Recent Decision of the Board Meets With Objections From Association.

CLAIM BASIS IS UNFAIR

Minimum Salary of \$95 Per Month Totally Inadequate to Meet Living Costs and Increase Provided is Not Enough.

The Grade Teachers' association of this city has entered a protest against the schedule of salaries adopted by the school board recently. The protest is based on several points fully explained in the letter forwarded by H. W. Gustin, secretary of the association, to the school board. As yet no action has been taken by the board in this regard. The letter, which is self-explanatory, follows:

Roseburg, Ore., April 12, 1920.
To the Honorable School Board, Dist. No. 4, Douglas County, Roseburg, Oregon.

Gentlemen:
The Grade Teachers' association of this city met in special session April 8th, 1920, to consider the salary schedule adopted by you on April 5, 1920. After giving careful consideration to all social and economic conditions affecting the life of every teacher today it was unanimously voted that the salary schedule adopted by you was entirely unsatisfactory for the following reasons:

1. The minimum salary of \$95 per month and the rate of increase allowed on the present year's contracts are altogether inadequate to meet the present and continually increasing high cost of living.

2. The recognition of a one and two years' term of service in this district, only as a basis for the advancement of salaries is unjust to those teachers who have served satisfactorily for a longer period.

3. The schedule, as adopted, has not been scrupulously followed in every instance.

It is also unanimously agreed that a uniform and adequate increase in salary for each group of teachers receiving the same remuneration this year would be satisfactory, provided; that the minimum salary for the year 1920-21 and for teachers now employed, be fixed at not less than \$115 per month for nine months.

In pursuance of the motion adopted, this report is read and presented to you in the presence of the members of the Grade Teachers' association of Roseburg, who with a keen sense of the responsibilities placed upon them and upon you, do request that you reconsider the salary question in order that a little time may be given teachers to look elsewhere for employment, if a living wage cannot be paid them here.

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 15.—An old fashioned cannon ball, of the 25-pound variety, used many years ago on this coast by the admiralty ships, caused the False Creek Lumber company a loss of \$250 the other day. It was imbedded in the center of a huge log cut at Duncan bay. The tree had grown around the ball and concealed it so well that it was not discovered until the saw struck it. The missile must have been discharged many years ago by a passing warship.

Wife of Soldier Kidnapped by Mex

EL PASO, April 15.—Mrs. R. L. Sanford, 25, wife of a horseherd in the 8th cavalry at Fort Bliss, was kidnapped by two Mexicans near the El Paso park entrance yesterday and taken to Juarez, where, according to her story, told in a nervous way today, she was mistreated by 15 Mexicans. The story is being investigated today.

Widow Must Serve A Jail Sentence

PITTSBURG, Kansas, April 15.—As the result of a raid in which officers found in the cellar of her house 14 cases of whiskey, Mrs. Jennie Pozhun, a widow and mother of four dependent children, must serve an indeterminate sentence at the women's farm-prison at Lansing. Declaring that Mrs. Pozhun had given "false testimony" at the trial, Judge A. J. Curran refused to entertain a plea that she be granted a parole.

Mrs. Pozhun testified that she did not know who placed the whiskey in her cellar. Officers testified that the only entrance to the cellar was a trap door under a bed in Mrs. Pozhun's bedroom.
