TOPEKA, Kan., April 15.—Whether the legal supervision of a guardian-at-law over an Indian is supposed to include the latter's matrimonial venture, must be decided by the Kansas supreme court in the habeas corpus proceedings brought by Carl J. O'Hornett, of Henrietta, Okla., to recover the guardianship of Jackson Barnett, 70, Henrietta, Okla., a Creek Indian, known as the richest Indian in the world, who owns oil lands valued at more than \$1,000,000. Under most romantic circumstances Barnett last February eloped and was married to a young white woman, Mrs. Anna Laura Lowe, of Coffeyville, Kan. O'Hornett charges that the old Indian's bride is "an adventuress of the most pronounced type," and that she "kidnapped" Barnett because of his wealth.
