Much Married Man In the Limelight

LOS ANGELES April 15.—Copies of a photograph identified as that of Nina Lee Deloney, said to be missing following her alleged marriage to Richard Hurl, will be sent to the police of many Pacific coast cities, it was announced tonight, in an effort to learn whether she is dead or alive. Hurl, alleged bigamist, whom officers charge with having entered into at least 35 marriages, is under guard in the Los Angeles county hospital, where he is receiving treatment from wounds inflicted in two alleged attempts at suicide. The theory that Richard Hurl is a "woman hater" and resorted to many marriages as revenge on women as a sex for sufferings caused him by a few, beginning with his mother, was advanced here today by Mrs. Elizabeth Williamson, of Sacramento, who said she married him August 28, 1919, when he was using the name of Harry Lewis.
