## TOO LIGHT FOR HEAVY WORK, SAYS NICHOLAS

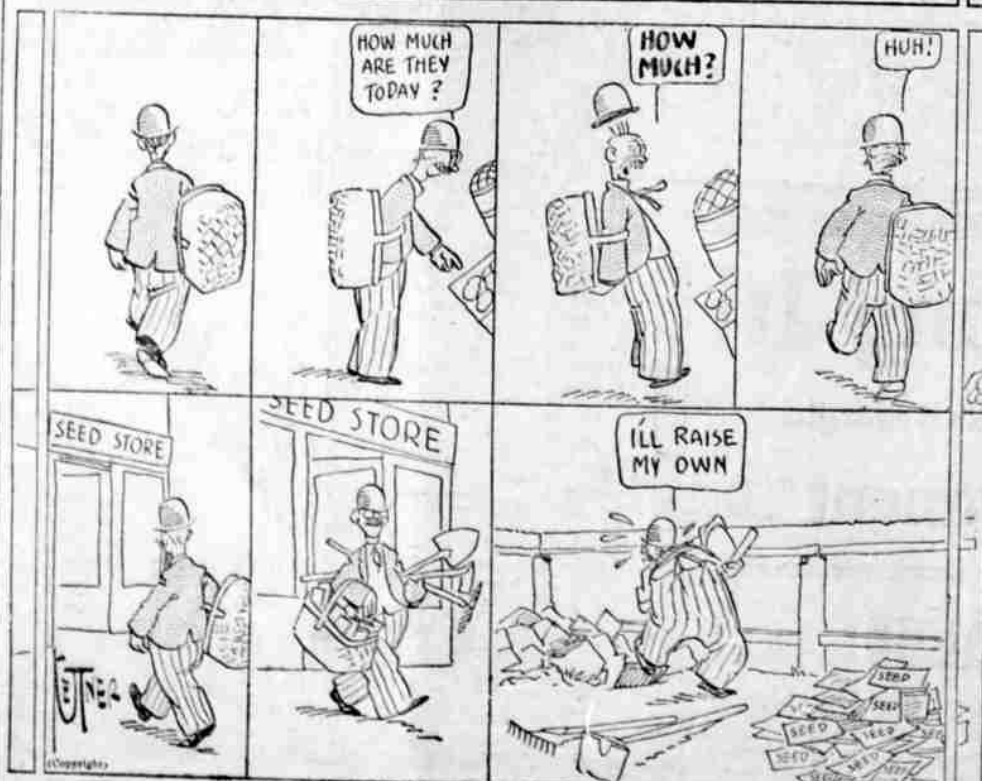

## PLANT FOODS IMPORTANT.

Plants depend for soil food chiefly upon ten soil elements. Five of these are always present in cultivated soils, but five others are likely to be exhausted by continuous cropping. These limited five are nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, calcium and sulfur. Soil surveys of Oregon counties to determine soil content and conditions are under way by O. A. C. and the U. S. D. A. The first publication of findings, "The Soils of Jackson County," has just been issued by the experiment station, O. A. C., Corvallis. Copies are free.
