SOLDIERS RELIEF BILL PREPARED

Hawley Subcommittee Completes Draft of Measure
Go Before Congress.

Government Will Acquire Land and Will Sell to Ex-Service Men Under Certain Agreements With a Loan For Equipment.

WASHINGTON, April 19.—The draft of a soldiers' settlement bill combining the salient features of the Mondell-Lane bill and the Fordney bill, together with some recommendations made by the American Legion, has been completed by the Hawley subcommittee of the house ways and means committee.

This tentative bill, which makes possible the reclamation of large areas by both irrigation and drainage, is understood to stand a good chance of being adopted by a full committee. An appropriation of \$25,000,000 is made for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1921, and the same sum thereafter each year for nine consecutive years, meaning a total of \$250,000,000.

For the administration of the functions arising under the bill a national soldiers' settlement board is created, consisting of five members to include the secretary of the interior and not less than three soldiers.

Land to be Acquired.
The board is authorized to acquire

lands, necessary for soldier settlement by gift or purchase and the secretary of the interior, with the approval of the president, is authorized to withdraw such public lands as may serve the purpose. The board is empowered to perform all work necessary for the permanent development of the projects selected, to be one or more in each of the several states in which such projects are found feasible.

The lands are to be subdivided into soldier farm units suitable for the support of a family and dedicating may be made for community and other public purposes. Townsites suitable for the purposes of the project may be established and developed.

Veterans of the world war, either soldiers or sailors, shall be allowed a credit of \$1.50 a day for the total number of days served between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, the full amount thus computed to be applied on purchase price of the land. The balance shall be paid in amortizing payment extending over a period of 40 years or less.

Two Years Grace Given.
The veteran settler will have two years from the time of the original credit for his war services before beginning his amortization payments.

Amortization payments will bear interest at the rate of 4 1/2 per cent yearly.

The lands also will be open to American citizens who served in and were honorably discharged from the military or naval service of the nations allied against the central powers between August 4, 1914, and November 11, 1918, except that they shall not be entitled to the premium credit for service as stipulated for soldiers in the service of the United States.

Lands acquired under this would not be subject to state, county, municipal and local taxation and assessment for a period of five years from the date of execution of the soldier's contract of purchase, and thereafter only upon the appraised value of the settler's interest in the land and improvements.

Other Land Open.
The board may, through an agreement with any soldier settler, make loans for improvements and the purchase of livestock and equipment in this acreage not to exceed \$1,500. Soldiers may take lands reclaimed under other acts of congress and be subject to the same premium credits and loan privileges.

A plan of co-operation with these states which have provided funds for soldier settlements is also authorized. The board is given authority to enter into contracts for such co-operation and then shall establish a branch administration office in that state, which shall, so far as practicable, handle all matters connected with project affairs in that state.

When the state furnishes not less than 25 per cent per annum of the necessary funds to carry on development of projects within its borders, the state will be authorized by the national board to carry on the selection, acquisition and subdivision of the land, improvement of farms and the aid and direction of development after settlement.

The board is obligated to utilize so far as possible the services of soldiers in the development and administration of the projects.

This bill, if approved by the full committee, will probably be incorporated in a general bill to cover all the six or seven plans for soldier relief legislation, which will include the cash bonus, homes in cities and towns, aid-up life insurance, and vocational training.

GREAT MARKET FOR BROCCOLI.

R. A. Busebark Tells of Need of Co-operation of Successful Growers.

Editor Roseburg News-Review: As you have been devoting some space in the past few issues to the discussion of broccoli, I might add a little. As a grower and as a member of the grange I have been into the game from the start. It seems that Mr. Butler is trying to discredit some of Dr. Bailey's efforts to make broccoli growing a success in Douglas county. While broccoli may have been and probably was grown in Douglas county for many years before Dr. Bailey even lived here, yet, without question, the "Father of the broccoli industry of Douglas county" belongs to Dr. Bailey.

It was through his efforts with the assistance of the Pomona Grange that broccoli growing was put on a commercial basis and it was thru the Umpqua Valley Fruit union (with Dr. Bailey, president) that a market we have never made a start to supply.

What we need is more growers as I know of no annual crop that brings such great returns. As to seed, Dr. Bailey grows good seed, so does Mr. Butler and Mr. Ueland. These are the only growers whose seed I have seen tried. The Portland Seed Co., puts out good seed and one of the best strains is grown by C. W. Kruse of Oswego, Ore. This seed is sold by the Umpqua Valley Fruit union.

Other sections of this country have become noted for special crops they can grow successfully so why not Douglas county and broccoli. The unusual freeze last fall damaged the crop fully 50 per cent, yet most of the growers will make good money this year. Let us forget our differences and all pull together and next year, instead of shipping out only 20 to 35 cars, let's ship out from 200 to 300 carloads.

Being as one-third of the babies of India die before their second year our own babies are not safe. A Christian doctor or teacher sent abroad is working for America as truly as though he worked at home.
6. **PREACHERS SALARIES.** The preacher is called the "budget man" and well he may be. Right out of ten preachers are paid less than \$20 a week!

Each denomination has its own detailed budget, and will administer its own funds. Your pastor has copies of the budget; examine them for yourself.
