

WOMAN'S COLLEGE STUDENTS PLAN NOVEL CUSTOM ORGANIZE "SUNSHINE GUARD" AT CAMPUS SUN DIAL

OAKLAND (Special) — The "Sunshine Guard" has been established at Mills College. Miss Stella Riggs of Portland, Oregon, has the honor of being the first to take her position at the famous college sun dial on the oval.

The "Sunshine Guard" is the idea of Mills students to serve as a reminder of "The Mills of Tomorrow." The needs of this woman's college will be met when the two million dollar endowment fund has been raised and until that time the "Sunshine Guard" watch will keep its vigil.

The 450 young women students have agreed to keep constant guard at the sun dial from the first class period in the morning until sundown. This will be accomplished by relays and the various dormitories will be given certain weeks for this responsibility. It will be arranged so that the half hour, or hour, spent by each student will not be lost time, but will be spent in preparing for the class room. If necessary a kiosk will be built to accommodate the "Sunshine Guard."

To all students and visitors who inquire the time, it is the duty of the special guard to reply "endowment time."

North Dakota Man Fights N. P. League

The ascendancy into power of the Non-Partisan League in North Dakota was like a sky-rocket, according to Arthur Foster, a farmer of Clyde, N. D., who will speak in this city next Wednesday evening in the circuit court room. In two years it had captured every political office in the state from the governorship down, had a newspaper in every county, had established co-operative stores and had under way the establishment or building of state owned banks, elevators, mills, packing plants and other state-owned league-controlled industries.

Mr. Foster lived in North Dakota during the league's activities and he is in possession of the facts concerning the men and methods back of it. He will deliver his lecture in this city under the auspices of the Oregon State Taxpayers' league. He is said to be a most interesting speaker.

and his message promises to be of value to every farmer. He declares that under the Non-Partisan regime in North Dakota taxes advanced as rapidly as did the power of the league. Tax valuations increased from 100 to 600 per cent and in 1919 there was an average increase of \$100 per voter in the amount of taxes levied. At the present time the decline of the league's power in that state is taking place just as rapidly. They are now seeking new fields in which to spread their doctrine and representatives announce that Oregon will be invaded by their collectors sometime in June or July.

Work Being Done For Near East

The following cablegram has been received from Constantinople from Col. W. N. Haskell, of the U. S. Army, official head of the Near East relief for the Caucasus district, and is being made public by the local county committee:

- December report shows the following activities maintained:
 - 80 orphanages, giving total support 21,000 orphans.
 - 26 hospitals.
 - 4000 occupied beds.
 - Over 17,000 daily hospital cases in thirty ambulances.
 - 17,000 refugees in camp.
 - 23,000 children fed in soup kitchens daily.
 - 290,000 refugees aided by bread and soup daily.
 - 10,300 individuals aided with employment in our industries.
 - 6700 received old clothing.
 - Over 20,000 individuals vaccinated with smallpox and vaccine.
 - 4300 orphans receiving industrial training.
- In spite of large relief above shown much remains undone. We must have funds or curtail efforts rather than expand to meet the desperate situation.
