Frost Did But Little Damage

Sunday's frost did not damage tree fruits, according to Fruit Inspector E. C. Armstrong, who has been making an investigation in several of the surrounding districts. The fruit was in no way injured by the chilling and growers will not suffer. Strawberries and ground plants were damaged slightly but no serious effects have been felt except in a few exposed localities.

Although no damage was done by the frost, fruit possibly has been injured to a great extent by the protracted wet season. The rain, it is feared, has prevented pollination and if such is the case the fruit will drop from the trees within a few weeks.

"It is hard to say just what the results will be," Mr. Armstrong says, "as it is too early to ascertain the extent of pollination. At the present time it looks as if we will have a bumper crop, one of the best we have ever had. But if the fruit did not receive sufficient pollen it will begin to drop within a few weeks. We may have a full crop and we may have only a half or quarter crop. The rain prevents the pollen from flying and consequently the fruit does not set properly. It will grow and appear strong and healthy for a short time and will then drop to the ground. At the present time grapes, pear, peach and apple blossoms appear to be in good condition and there are plenty of prospects for a good crop. However, a drop may occur which will spell complete failure. It may be, though, we will have a good crop and if the fruit sets as we hope it will we will have a fine crop."

Bates Buried at Riddle Sunday

The funeral of Odie Bates, who was killed at Riddle Friday, was held at Riddle yesterday. Bates was a young man 19 years of age and was quite popular in the community. He leaves a widowed mother and several other relatives who reside in the immediate vicinity of Riddle. Owing to the events surrounding his death and the popularity of the deceased, the funeral was largely attended. Arthur Thompson, who inflicted the wound which resulted in Bates' death, is being held in the county jail under a murder charge and will appear before the grand jury, having waived examination in the Riddle justice court.

Postal Clerks May Don Denim

The clerks of the local post office are considering donning overalls during the period of the high clothing cost as a part of the nation-wide campaign now on to force a reduction in the price of wearing apparel. The clerks have this privilege and in many places are wearing denim while about their usual duties. The law prescribes that carriers wear the regulation uniform and at the present time they are unable to put on overalls while about their regular work. Postmaster Reizenstein has written Washington in an effort to

secure permission for the carriers to don denim, and if received they will appear in the regulation garb for the laboring man.

P. O. Official Passes Through

Division Post Office Inspector S. H. Morse, of San Francisco, passed through Roseburg Saturday evening enroute home from Portland, where he had been for the past few days. He accompanied the remains of Post Office Inspector Flabin to Portland, where burial took place. The deceased passed away suddenly last week in the office of Mr. Morse in San Francisco. Mr. Morse was formerly stationed in Roseburg and is well known here, while Inspector Flabin, also formerly of this city, was connected with the local post office, establishing the city mail delivery system about 15 years ago.

The auditorium of the Presbyterian church was filled Saturday evening at the concert given by the Albany college instructors in voice and piano. The program offered by them was varied and held the interest of everyone. The first part contained classical and popular numbers, and the second consisted of the four areas of life, in costume. TO TEACH BLIND IS AIM OF BILL.

To place the blind people of Oregon on a self-supporting basis, relieving them from dependence on charity, is the purpose of the legislative bill to be voted on by the people of Oregon at the special state election May 21st.

The bill provides for the levying of one-sixth of one mill as a state tax to be used to erect and equip an industrial and employment institution for the benefit of the blind of this state. Oregon like all other states is faced with the problem of providing some method of giving permanent aid to the unfortunate and helpless blind. The world war resulted in the blinding of many sons of America, an unfortunate happening which has awakened the people to their duty in teaching the blind arts and trades which will make them independent of charity.

The bill provides for the levying of one twenty-fifth of one mill in 1921 and each year thereafter to maintain the institution. The amount sought will be small, but it is believed by the supporters of the measure that the compensation derived through the institution will repay the citizens of Oregon a hundred fold in producing good citizenry and providing a practical way for the blind to become self-supporting.

The bill provides that the institution shall be operated by the state board of control, composed of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer.
