PROPERTY IS NOT INVOLVED IN TAX.

No direct property tax whatever is required for the state highway bonds to be issued under the constitutional amendment to be voted upon at the election May 21. The measure is for increasing the state road bond limit from two per cent to four per cent of the assessed valuation of property within the state, thus making it possible to issue sufficient bonds to complete the main state highways.

Principal and interest for these bonds are financed entirely by the auto license fees and gasoline tax, without any necessity for increasing either the license fee or the tax above the rates now being paid. At present rates, figuring only on a small increase in the number of autos for the next few years, the revenue from these sources will not only take care of interest and principal of all bonds that can be issued under the four per cent limit, but will leave an annual surplus to be expended for other state highway

purposes. No direct tax on property is required, and no increase either in auto license fees or gas tax.

A tabulation showing these revenues and the payments on interest and principal, has been issued officially by the state legislative committee and published in the official state pamphlet now being mailed to all registered voters.

The attack upon the young woman took place while she was going to Mulberry from her home. She was found tied to two trees by a small boy. Her throat was slashed. According to physicians, however, she will probably recover.
