## "Father" Grammer Accepts Challenge

F. M. McGlasson. Dear Sir and Brother: Your challenge in the Roseburg News-Review was just brought to my attention about five minutes ago. I avail myself of the earliest possible moment to reply. But the man who knows the things that I know, cannot be "a man of the world," but one who is born into the kingdom of God. Jesus says, "He that doeth my will shall know of my doctrine," and I say he who knows his doctrine can do his works. I do not claim, nor have I ever claimed, to do the healing in and of myself, but have always given God the glory. He is the only healing power that I know, or care to know. Neither did Jesus Christ claim to do the healing himself, but said it was the Father who worked in him to will and to do of His own good pleasure. I challenge your Christian spirit when you affirm that I am a fraud.
