MR. J. G. DAY CRITICIZES METHOD OF MANAGEMENT.

Editor News-Review: Desiring to convey to the republican voters of Douglas county some criticisms on the management of county business, and a protest against further diversion of road district funds by the present county court, I respectfully ask space in your columns.

The Oregon road law of 1917 is plainly worded and its provisions are easily within the grasp of ordinary minds. It empowers the county court of each county within the state to levy a tax not to exceed 10 mills on the taxable value of the county for road purposes, 70 per cent of which shall be apportioned to the road districts in such proportion that the taxable value of each district bears to the taxable value of the county, and the remaining 30 per cent may be expended for roads within the county as directed by the county court. Acting thereunder such court of this county in December, 1919, levied the following amounts:

Which sum if apportioned according to the provisions of said law would yield to the separate road funds as follows:

But the declared intention of the court is to limit the amount to be apportioned on the 70 per cent basis to the sum of \$84,000, and thereby reduce the amount available; during the current year for the maintenance of lateral roads over which the products of the county are conveyed to the meager sum of \$58,000.

To levy a tax specifically for bridge construction or for a further contribution to the funds of the state highway commission, is to act outside of authority. To strain interpretation of a plain provision of law, to excuse the diversion of the road district fund from its proper use for any purpose, however meritorious, is in my judgment, indefensible. In emergencies for bridge repair or construction at a time when the funds are not available from the usual source, it is provided that any fund not required for immediate use may be appropriated therefor, conditioned on timely restitution, and there is no necessity to misappropriate road district funds, as large amounts are now idle in the county treasury.

Valuable Hint To Motorists

A local automobile dealer today received a letter from his firm which contained a great deal of valuable information to the average motorist and one of the paragraphs which will be interesting to every auto owner reads as follows:

"The gasoline we are now getting is very low gravity and a portion of it does not burn. The portion that does not explode runs down the cylinder walls, drops into the crank case and becomes mixed with the lubricating oil. This reduces the quality of the oil and if allowed to continue will cause your bearings to burn out and the cylinder walls and pistons to wear. In order to avoid this, we strongly urge you to change the oil in your crankcase at least every 1000 miles, was out with distillate or kerosene and refill with fresh oil."
