



New Figure Is Set on Imports

Exports for March were the second largest on record and a new figure was set for imports, according to a statement issued today by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce, department of commerce.

The value of exports for the month was \$820,000,000, which is second only to the total of \$925,300,000 for June, 1919. The exports for February were \$848,000,000, and for March a year ago, \$893,000,000. For the nine months ended with March, goods were exported to the extent of \$6,651,000,000, or more than a billion dollars in excess of the \$4,955,000,000 recorded for the corresponding period of 1919.

Imports for March totaled \$484,000,000, exceeding by \$10,000,000 the high record of January, 1920. The total imports in February of this year were \$486,000,000, and in March of last year, \$268,000,000. For the nine months ended with March imports totaled \$3,719,000,000, or approximately a billion and a half more than for the corresponding period of the previous year.

Imports of gold amounted to \$17,000,000 in March, and to \$60,000,000 for the nine months ended with March, against \$28,000,000 for the nine months of the previous year. Exports of gold in March were valued at \$470,000,000, and in the nine months of this year at \$409,000,000, against only \$30,000,000 last year. Silver imports were \$9,000,000 in March and \$78,000,000 in the nine months, while silver exports were \$14,000,000 for the month and \$151,000,000 in the nine months ended with March.
