

### Plant Quarantine To be Enforced

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, April 29.—Measures to co-ordinate plant quarantine restrictions of eleven western states, the Canadian province of British Columbia, territory of Hawaii and the northern district of California, will be considered at the second annual meeting of the Western Plant Quarantine Board to be held here May 11 to 12.

G. H. Becke, director of agriculture for California, is president of the board and the meeting call came from his office in Sacramento. Governor Simon Bamberger of Utah has accepted an invitation to address the board.

The organization was founded at Riverside, California, in May, 1919, and the membership is made up of quarantine officers. Its purpose, as announced at the time of formation, is to erect a barrier against importation of plant pests and diseases that have already found root on the Pacific slope. The best means of accomplishing this purpose, it was agreed, is through uniform quarantine restrictions.

Methods of enforcing restrictions will be one of the chief topics at the May conference.

### 12,000 French War Brides Leave U. S.

PITTSBURGH, April 29.—Incompatibility of American and French customs has caused 12,000 of approximately 50,000 French war brides to return to France, according to Mrs. Reginald H. Johnson, president of the recently organized L'Espoir Franco-American club here. The club, formed at the suggestion of Mlle. Odette de Bouillon, of Paris, who was in Pittsburgh recently, is expected to broaden the interests of French girls who became the brides of Americans overseas, and to make them contented in their new homes.

Mrs. Johnson, herself a war bride, and wife of a professor of languages at the University of Pittsburgh, declared that members of the club are learning English, of course, but slowly and "when one cannot talk, one thinks too much."

"We of France are individualists," she said. "We live within ourselves and our own people, and that makes it doubly hard for the French girls who have left their homes and families. Not that they do not love their husbands, to be sure, but they miss their people."

### Four Railroad Men Arrested

Ten men, among whom were four railroaders who make their headquarters in Roseburg, were arrested near midnight Monday night at the Golden Drift dam on the Rogue river near Grants Pass, taken before the justice of peace charged with fishing for salmon with snag hooks and in illegal water. It was charged that the fishing was in the pool just below the dam and that the salmon were taken with heavy drag hooks. Six of the defendants were brought before the bar of justice by Deputy Game Warden Ed. Walker.

The four railroad men who make their headquarters in this city, and who were also arrested at the same time, had to take their train out Tuesday and their hearing was postponed until yesterday afternoon. Three of the fishermen, a father and two sons, were fined \$75 and costs for the elder and \$50 and costs for each of the two boys.

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### Man Killed Was Enroute Roseburg

According to newspaper reports published in Portland publication, Erick Benson, who was killed Monday night near Oregon City when he was struck by an automobile, was enroute to Roseburg where he was to be employed. According to witnesses of Benson's death, the man with Alfred Lind was riding on an auto truck south along the road when the machine broke down. After the accident the two men sat on the disabled truck until arrangements had been made to tow it to Oregon City, and then climbed on intending to ride on the first machine. As Benson started around the truck a big touring car bound for Portland swept around the curve in the road and struck Benson, passing partly over his body. The driver of the touring car is said to have then backed up and turning sharply to avoid the body in the road put on full speed and dashed away before any of those about could not the license number. In Benson's pockets was found an I. W. W. card. Benson and Lind, both laborers, were on their way to Roseburg to get work, according to Lind.

### Will Save Road Fund From Waste

The proposed constitutional amendment raising the state bonding limit from two to four per cent, to be voted on Friday, May 21, will make available \$20,000,000 to be used in constructing roads throughout Oregon. That the money will be saved and the roads built from waste is the startling statement of Hon. R. A. Booth, of Eugene, member of the state highway commission.

"The funds obtained from license fees and gasoline tax are sufficient to pay interest and retire all bonds issued under the proposed plan," said Mr. Booth. The average cost of gasoline is 25 cents a gallon and the tax is one cent a gallon. Therefore when I travel over roads making 154 miles and using the same amount of gasoline as previously was required to cover but 100 miles, I have saved the tax, and all additional mileage is gain.

"Tire casings average \$40 each and licenses cost about \$20 each. When one casing is saved in a year twice the cost of a license is saved and a set saved, therefore, eight times the cost of the license. I have saved a set and not cut down mileage during the past year. Add to this decreased wear and tear on
