CONFERENCE MAY SOLVE DIFFICULTY

Americans and Japanese Get Together to Settle the Country's Relations.

RESULTS SUMMARIZED

Japanese Partnership of Land and Immigration Are Two of the Vital Questions Which Are of Deep Concern.

TOKIO, March 30.—(By the Associated Press Correspondent).—The conference just concluded here by the Japanese-American relations committee

This conference was an outgrowth of an initial meeting of representatives from both countries in Tokyo in April, 1919.

"Japanese ownership of land and immigration—These are the two vital questions which deeply concern the two peoples.

"Exchange of professorships—Great benefits come from exchange professorships. In order that this enterprise can be satisfactorily conducted

"Trade arbitration—There is danger that the good relations of the two countries may be jeopardized on account of disputes that may arise from commercial complications.

"Industry.—The labor question has a direct relation to industry and it is of an international nature.

"After eight days of the conference, the joint committee was dissolved with many expressions of mutual esteem and satisfaction over the work accomplished.
