British Troops to Aid Sultan's Army

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 30.—British troops, it is believed here, plan to co-operate with the Sultan's armies to a movement against the Turkish nationalists in the campaign in Asia Minor, and will join in an aggressive offensive against Mustafa Kemal. Elaborate preparations for sending the British troops are being made by army officials at points along the Aegean coast and the sea of Marmora.

New Jersey Gives Wood 1207 Majority

NEWARK, N. J., April 30.—Complete and practically accurate returns from the New Jersey primary give Wood a lead of 1207 votes over Hiram Johnson. The total vote cast for Wood is 52,698, and Johnson, 51,491.

May Day Strike In France Continued

PARIS, April 30.—Miners throughout France will continue their May Day demonstration into a widespread general strike, in accordance with the decision of the railroad workers and the resolution of the General Labor Federation, so the secretary of the miners' union announced today.

Cause of Fire Not Located

No investigation of the Mercy hospital fire has been made yet. The Sisters of Mercy are taking an inventory and are checking up the loss in anticipation of the arrival of the insurance adjusters who are expected to arrive in the very near future. The special investigator ordered here by the state fire marshal has not yet arrived and in the meantime nothing will be done towards determining the origin of the fire. Many rumors, all unfounded, are afloat as yet no cause for the conflagration, which was the fourth in the history of the structure, has been found.

TAKES MAIL ROUTE.

F. A. Clemens, who recently moved to this city from Edenbow, has taken over as a sub-contractor the mail route in operation between Roseburg and Cleveland. He succeeds A. A. Maine, who has been conducting the route for nearly two years past for J. W. Hall, who is the original contractor. During summer and fall of the present year, Mr. Maine will be employed at teamster work with his brother at Marshfield, where a street paving contract has been let.

Section Gang's Escape Narrow

A section gang composed of Mexicans had a narrow escape last night, when a hand car on which they were riding was struck by an engine and consumed by flames. The accident occurred on the curve at the entrance to the city and neither the members of the engine crew nor the section hands saw the other until a warning was shouted by C. R. Cayender of Winchester street who was working in his garden and sensed the oncoming catastrophe. The Mexicans lost no time in unloading but it was too late to save the handcar and it was knocked for several hundred feet down the track, scattering picks, shovels, coats and dinner pails all along the line. When the remains had been collected it was found that there were no injuries beyond a few minor bruises where the human beings failed to land right side up and after picking up the implements which had been distributed over several square acres of the landscape the section men came on into the city.

TO COPE WITH VIOLENCE.

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Federal agents have been instructed to "go as far as the law will allow" in breaking up radical May Day demonstrations that are alleged to have been planned by communists, labor parties and other exponents of force to bring about "reform." In making this announcement Assistant Attorney General Garvin said the department of justice officials were concentrating all efforts to protect the lives of federal and state officials who have been marked for death, and to prevent violence generally. Information in possession of the department was said to reveal that radical elements both in the United States and in Europe were planning to make Saturday the first "real" international labor day.
