\$50 FOR A NAME

Explains Action of Father White

The venerable Archdeacon Chambers of Portland arrived here today and will conduct services tomorrow at the Episcopal church. Archdeacon Chambers in conversation with a News-Review representative this morning made a statement concerning the action of Father Russell White, who recently left this city rather unexpectedly to attend his family's anniversary in South Bend, Indiana, and who later announced that he had become vicar of the Episcopal church in South Bend. This announcement came as a complete surprise to the members of the local parish and Archdeacon Chambers made a complete explanation today. Father White left the Chicago district some time ago to locate in the west, declaring that he would never return to that section of the country to locate. Shortly after his arrival here he received a call from South Bend asking him to return there and become his father's archdeacon. He refused many flattering offers and declined his father's parish upon several occasions. Later he was informed by telegram that his father was suffering from arterial sclerosis and at the age of 70 years was very feeble and unable to attend to his duties. However, the Sunday before he left Roseburg he informed his congregation that he was going to return here following his stay at several days in South Bend attending the family anniversary. The following Tuesday he received another telegram announcing the critical illness of his father and asking that he accept the parish there in order to make his father's old age happy. He was unable to refuse this offer and brokenhearted he was forced to abandon his position in Roseburg and leave his many friends here without bidding them farewell. He writes that he contemplates a return here to stay some time in the future and express the thought that no place would seem quite as good as "dear old Roseburg."

Former Roseburg Man Confesses to Murder in 1906

WOODLAND, Cal., April 26.—Hailed into court by his young wife on a battery charge, Percy Steele, known here under the name of Frank Young, today confessed to the murder of Alonzo Bledsoe. Bledsoe was slain on Christmas eve of 1906 in Williamsburg, Ky. Steele refused to discuss details of the crime. The case is further complicated by the declaration of Steele's wife that at the time of their marriage Steele was not divorced from a former wife by whom he has three children. Numerous times, Steele said, he has been on the verge of confessing. After attending a revival meeting here three weeks ago he determined to make a clean breast of the crime but, he asserted, he changed his mind. Immediately after shooting Bledsoe, Steele fled from Kentucky. His wife, formerly Polly Sizemore, later joined him in Kansas. Life with her, he said, was a "continual domestic squabble." Later they moved to Pomona, Cal., thence to Roseburg, Ore. After a bitter quarrel, Mrs. Steele returned to Pomona with their three children. About a year ago, Steele, who is 40 years old, and Mary Morse, 20 years his junior, were married in Idaho. They came to Woodland early this year and have an infant child. During their residence here they have been using the name of Young. He has worked as carpenter and contractor. Last night his wife fled to neighbors for protection, saying her husband had beaten her and threatened to kill her. She was bruised on the head and body. She obtained a warrant for his arrest and he was taken before Justice of the Peace R. W. Harrison. Unable to furnish bail of \$2500, he was lodged in the county jail.

TOURIST ARRESTED.

August W. Pemberton, a tourist from California, was arrested here last night upon telegraphic information from Sheriff R. E. Veale, of Martinez, Calif. The officers are unable to ascertain the nature of the crime with which the prisoner is charged but Pemberton says that it is for family trouble that he is being held. A telegram received this afternoon from Sheriff Veale says that a deputy will be here the first of the week.

CLASHES IN PARIS.

(By Associated Press) PARIS, May 1.—A clash between republican guards, the police and 7,000 May Day demonstrators occurred this afternoon in the boulevards in the St. Martin quarter. Two shots were fired during the melee and several persons were reported wounded. The disturbance was the first active disorder of the day. Two socialist members of the chamber of deputies were injured in a clash with the police this afternoon near the Place de la Republique. Two persons were killed and about 50 were injured, most of the merrily, in a series of small riots in the eastern part of the city this afternoon.

RED FLAG HOISTED.

CHICAGO, May 1.—The police were called to a school house on the west side early today when a red flag was discovered above the building. A former soldier removed the flag, which bore the legend, "Hurrah for the soviet. Death to the capitalists."
