

Engine and Auto In Collision

The car driven by Albert Miedel was quite badly smashed Saturday evening when it was struck by a local switch engine at the Mosher street crossing. This crossing is a dangerous one having no protection, while the Dysinger mill makes it practically blind on the side adjoining the roundhouse. His car was driven across the street, hurled through a switch stand, and in a badly smashed condition, was draped over the front end of the engine when it was stopped. The fact that the engine was traveling slowly was all that saved a serious accident. Miedel was uninjured, and the mechanism of his car was not badly damaged, the rear portion of the body, however, being almost demolished.

HIRAM JOHNSON TO VISIT ROSEBURG

California Senator to Stop in
City and Address Mass
Meeting of Citizens.

CAMPAIGN TO START

Big Corps of Able Speakers Will
Spend Month in State in Interest
of Aspirant for the Presi-
dential Honors.

Senator Hiram Johnson will visit and speak in Roseburg during the present month as a part of his whirlwind campaign for president of the United States, according to word received by Paul Turner, a Johnson organizer, who has been spending the past week in this city. A campaign which will cover the entire state, spreading enthusiasm for California's senator, will start in Oregon Wednesday and a corps of able speakers will visit every section of the state. This campaign will last until election day on May 21, but previous to that time Senator Johnson himself will tour Oregon and will stop at all of the principal cities, Roseburg being listed in his itinerary.

Speakers who have been working in California are freed by the primary election which occurs there tomorrow, and will immediately invade Oregon in the interest of the candidate whose sensational run has thrown a panic into the camps of his opponents. These speakers include some of the most able business men and orators in the country and they will be prepared to discuss any phase of Senator Johnson's candidacy. They will travel singly and in parties and expect to cover every portion of the state. They will remain in Oregon until the day of election and will visit practically every city. They will invade the state from the south on Wednesday and will work northward from that point, several speakers going directly to Portland and working out from that place also.

The exact date of Hiram Johnson's visit has not yet been ascertained. The telephone message received this morning by Mr. Turner from state headquarters at Portland merely stated that Senator Johnson had announced through his campaign manager that a flying trip would be made to Oregon before the election date, and this news has spread to all sections. Headquarters had listed Roseburg as one of the places to be visited, and instructed Mr. Turner to state that the candidate will spend at

least several hours in the city and will make an address at a public mass meeting. He is a wonderful speaker and there is no doubt but that hundreds will avail themselves of the opportunity to hear this great man.

He has a large political following in this community and an attempt is being made by Mr. Turner to organize a Johnson club in Roseburg. A chairman will be appointed at once and active work will be started by the local organization to further the campaign which is to be made.

The exact date of the visit of Hiram Johnson will be further details regarding the trip are to be forwarded at once. Prior to his coming other speakers will be in Roseburg and will make talks in the interest of their candidate.

TO THE REPUBLICAN VOTERS OF DOUGLAS COUNTY

Comments on Road District Funds,
by J. G. Day, Jr., Candidate
for County Judge.

Road District Fund.
Each road district in the county has an enforceable right to compel the county court to apportion 70 per cent of the annual general road fund tax to each district in such proportion that the taxable value of each district bears to the taxable value of the county, and each district is entitled to have its share expended for road purposes within the year in which the tax is collected. The semi-annual report dated Dec. 31, 1919, showing the condition of the various funds resulting from the orders of the county court, reveals the fact that full apportionment to the road district fund was not made in 1919, and that an additional amount of \$11,120.12 is due therefor. And it is also therein shown that less than 25 per cent accruing to the road district fund from taxes collected during 1919 was expended during that year, and that of the total amount claimed to have been disbursed for the improvement of district roads during 1919, over 75 per cent thereof had been carried over from the apportionment made in 1918.

The total amount of taxes collected in 1919 credited to the general road fund is \$117,498.38, and an apportionment thereof to the road district fund on a 70 per cent basis would give \$82,248.86.

Total amount of road district fund retained in county treasury and available in the fall of 1919 for road improvement...\$73,749.07
During the legislative session of 1919 an initial attempt was made to adopt a system of state supervision of expenditures for county roads and unless misuse of road funds is stopped, taxpayers will have to support costly state supervision over county road improvements.
