Will Demonstrate Poultry Methods

Judge George W. Masterson, of California, is expected to be in the city about the 15th of the month and will conduct a demonstration at the Vossburgh poultry yard. Judge Masterson is one of the leading poultrymen in the country and has been breeding and exhibiting poultry for 25 years. He will discuss culling, breeding, treatment of diseases and the financial aspect of the business. Former lectures and demonstrations of a similar nature, have been well received in the county and doubtless there will be a great deal of interest shown in the coming event.

STILL SETTLING TAXES.

The tax department is still engaged in sorting out and crediting the checks sent by mail in payment of taxes. The work has been greatly simplified this year by the cooperation of residents of the county, by far the greater majority paying by mail. This has resulted in a great reduction in errors and has made the work easier and has saved expense by eliminating the necessity of putting on additional clerks. There is still a great accumulation of mail and it may be a week or ten days before all receipts are sent out.

County Judge D. J. Stewart has received a letter from the secretary of the Northwest Automobile caravan, asking that the roads be put in shape for the trip which will start this month. The caravan will reach Roseburg on the 18th of the month and it is desired that the rough spots be smoothed up. Judge Stewart will immediately take the matter up with the contractors who are working on various sections of the highway.

School Tax Facts Are Announced

Some pertinent facts were developed by County School Superintendent O. C. Brown at Sutherlin last Saturday at the school meeting at which he discussed the educational measures to be brought before the voters at the coming election. Out of nine school districts in the immediate vicinity of Sutherlin only one voted less than the two-mill levy. Under the new law, all would receive more money than at the present time and would vote a lesser rate of tax. In the one district excepted there is only one family, the land being owned by non-residents.

There are ten school districts in the county, having a total valuation of \$1,250,000, that are paying no school tax. There are twenty-three districts having a total value of \$5,000,000 that have been voting less than two mills while there is a great amount of valuable land totally unorganized which pays no tax for school purposes.

Under the provisions of the proposed law, a direct millage tax is imposed on all lands and the burden is borne equally and distributed according to needs.

GRAND JURY CALLED.

Notices are being sent out by the county clerk to members of the grand jury announcing that the grand jury term will commence May 11. The date is set early in order that the work may be completed in time to allow jurors to return to their homes in time for election. The jury is the same as at the last term of court and has a hard task ahead of it. The circuit court will meet May 24 in its regular May term.

DIVIDED SESSION FAVORED.

There appears to be considerable sentiment favoring the divided session of the legislature amendment. This measure which proposes to hold two meetings of the legislature at separate intervals will be voted on at the coming election. Petitions are being signed freely and the measure will doubtless secure a good vote.

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Many Salmon Caught Sunday

With the advent of spring and the fishing season, the devotees of Isak Walton are lured to the various streams a short distance from the city to try their luck with the first catch of the season, and Sunday the spring sunshine shone upon many with a red and line. From all reports more than a few of the finny tribe were captured, the size in most cases being sufficient to supply the "catches" and their friends with food the greater part of the week. A short distance this side of Umpqua seemed to be an especially favored spot Sunday, and many local fishermen spent the entire day there fishing and "picnicking." Few there were who did not catch a good-sized salmon. Rudolph Harms, local automobile dealer, landed a 26-lb. salmon; Ray Wright, landore Abraham and Clarence Perkins each having to their credit salmon weighing from 20 to 22 pounds. According to spectators, the party came near being broken up when Mr. Abraham landed his share of the catch, it being the first he had ever caught, and his delight was too great to be expressed silently.

WARNING IS ISSUED.

Game Warden Charles Stark of Sutherlin announced yesterday that a warning has been issued concerning fishing and that hereafter anyone caught without a license will be arrested and fined. No arrests will be made, he stated, until this warning has been published, as he believes in giving everyone a fair chance. It is the duty of the game warden to see that the fishing laws are not violated and his several deputies will be kept on the job through the entire season.
