## BUTTE INVADED NUMEROUS TIMES

Greatest Mining City In the World Has Considerable Labor Trouble.

### HOTBED FOR I. W. W.

When Troops Were Called on April 22nd It Constituted the Fourth Time Military Forces Have Invaded City of Butte.

BUTTE, Mont., May 5.—The arrival here of United States troops, sent on April 22, 1920, to preserve peace following a strike called by Metal Mine Workers' Union No. 8, Industrial Workers of the World, constituted the fourth military invasion of this, the greatest mining city in the world.

Butte's first serious labor trouble developed in 1914. It was the host of the old Butte Miners' Union No. 1, Western Federation of Labor, that it never had a strike during 33 years of its existence. Wages were comparatively high and living comparatively cheap. A large per cent of the miners owned their own homes and they were conservative.

The period of his affection began about 1910, when radical elements in the camp began to coalesce under the leadership of the Rev. Lewis J. Duncan, a socialist. Duncan left the pulpit for the radical lecture platform and in 1911, ran for mayor and was elected overwhelmingly. Duncan was re-elected mayor in 1913, by a large vote, and, it is said, immediately began his battle for control of the Butte miners' union and through it of the Western Federation of Miners, which embraced almost all the metal miners in the land.

The conservatives in the union, backed by Charles H. Moyer, president of the federation, resisted. On June 13, 1914, the annual parade of the miners' union was broken up by men said to be I. W. W. and Duncan followers.

Moyer came to Butte from Denver to investigate. On the night of June 26, he attended a conference in the miners' hall. A mob gathered outside. Deputy sheriffs were sent to the hall to protect Moyer, who was threatened. Shots were fired. It became a fusillade and two men in the crowd were hit. One of them died.

The mob stormed the hall. Moyer fled to Helena, where he appealed to Governor Sam V. Stewart for protection. Meanwhile, the hall was blown up and a reign of terror was created. A sort of soviet was established with "Muckie" McDonald as dictator. McDonald chose a cabinet of 20 for advisers.

Buildings were dynamited. The radicals broke into factions and a Finn leader tried to assassinate Mayor Duncan, but was killed by Duncan. The Finn faction then blew up Duncan's socialist printing house. People began to leave Butte in droves.

The governor sent the Second Montana Guard—in the Great War, afterwards, the 163rd Infantry—to Butte. The troops quickly dissolved into "soviet." McDonald and several others were soon afterward sent to prison and the mayor was removed from office by legal proceedings instituted by the governor for failure to preserve the peace.

The election of 1915 was carried by the conservatives. Duncan left Butte and allied himself with the National Non-Partisan league, one of whose papers in North Dakota he edited. He is now, it is said, running an employment office in Minneapolis. McDonald was paroled by Governor Stewart. Later he was reported to have insulted the governor during a mass meeting in Butte in 1916. He went back to serve out his term, but soon after gained his freedom.

Duncan and McDonald were succeeded by W. F. Dunn, in his early youth a prize fighter and later an organizer for a union of electrical workers. Dunn came to Butte from Canada and with E. R. Smith of Butte, set up the Butte Bulletin, a weekly radical newspaper. In 1917 trouble again broke out and this time, federal troops went into Butte, because the war demanded that copper production go ahead without interruption.

Soon after an editorial in the Bulletin advised the public to ignore orders of the state council of defense. Dunn, as writer of this article, and Smith, as editor of the paper, were tried in Helena under the state sedition act, convicted and fined \$5,000 each. Their case is pending before the state supreme court.

In the fall of 1919 federal troops were again obliged to spend some time in Butte. Meanwhile, Dunn's paper began to advocate the soviet system and later the One Big Union. After the disruption of the union in 1914 by the "McDonald Rebellion," the conservative miners never re-organized. The I. W. W. and the O. B. U. are said to control those Butte miners who belong to a union now.

### PLENTY OF MIRACLES.

Editor News-Review: I want to say for encouragement of your pencil pusher that I enjoyed reading his article headed "Question of God's Power Unsettled," and it would remain undecided if a man had to form his decisions from the argument of the speakers. As for there being but two epochs in the period of the world as affirmed by Mr. McGlasson, the one at the departure of children of Israel out of Egypt, the other during the apostolic period for the first 100 years A. D., when miracles were performed. Any Bible student knows better. The fact is, miracles had their beginning with the beginning of time and will cease only when time ceases.

I will refer to a few prior to the departure of Israel out of Egypt: Gen. 11:7, the confounding of language; Gen. 12:17, Pharaoh plagued on account of Sarai, Jacob at "Peniel," Gen. 22:13, the deliverance of Hagar and Ishmael, Gen. 21, 19. After crossing the Red Sea we have Exod. 16, Quail and Manna sent; water brought from the rock, Exod. 17, 6. What shall I say more? Remember Lot's wife. The san stood still at command of Joshua. The hand writing on the wall, Daniel delivered from the lion's den, three Hebrew children from the fiery furnace, Elijah raised the woman's son, etc. If God is changeable, then miracles will cease, but I read in the Old Book of Books "that God chaungeth not." Mal. 3, 6.

And Paul in Hebrews 13:8, says "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today and forever." Jesus Christ is God, for he said, "The father and I am one." Then he said, "I will send you another comforter even the spirit of truth, that he may abide with you forever." St. John 14:16-17. So the spirit of God is still among men and did not cease to function at the death of the 12 disciples, but Christ prayed the same blessings on them whom he believed in him through the word of the apostles. St. John 17:21, etc., and they who believed through the apostles' teachings were to do mighty works. Mark 16:17. "In my name they shall cast out devils, they shall speak with other tongues."

Is the man of today who is called of God by the Holy Ghost doing any less a work than Peter or Paul, when he by earnest prayer and teaching induces a man to believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and God for Christ's sake forgives his sins? He has done a great work, as the instrument in God's hands of getting the sick soul to the Great Physician. The days of miracles are not over. Before going farther, let's define a miracle.

A miracle is a supernatural operation performed alone by the power of God. John 3:2.

God never does for man what man can do for himself, and never did. God has his healers today but they are not of the Father, Russell or Mother Eddy type.

My son, when a reporter on the St. Louis Republic, St. Louis, Mo., covered a case where a man was stabbed in the heart, the surgeon took nine stitches between heart beats and saved the man's life. That surgeon says he never goes to the operating room without asking God to go with and help him in his work. Was he less a healer than Paul?

In November, 1893, at Millsholes, Ill., one Isaac Gallant, a drunkard, so debauched that he was not able to work for days at a time, was made a special subject of prayer by the pastor's wife. He came to the meeting, was converted, the appetite for whiskey was taken from him, and as a surprise to all his associates, he never lost a day's work for more than six months after. Was that little woman any less a healer than Peter when he healed the impotent man at the gate, for when he asked help the woman went and took him to the Lamb of God that takes away the sin of the world. So Peter did the impotent man. Uncle Cy Griffith of St. Elmo, Ill., had chronic tobacco for over 60 years, was converted, asked God to cleanse him, soul and body. He took the tobacco from him, he took it to his two old companions, "By the grace of God I will never take another chew," asking God to take the appetite from him, he threw the tobacco away. I saw him nearly 20 years afterwards and he told me he never had wanted to become in all those years. He was living two years ago, about 90 years old.

Perhaps I ought to quit with this, but your indulgence while I relate one more well known instance. At campmeeting held by the Free Methodists at Greenville, Ill., in 1881 or 1882, a Miss Gillilan, having cancer of the breast, was brought from Chicago (against the physician's advice) on a stretcher. One day during the hour of prayer she declared she was healed. Preacher Colt's wife, being skeptic on the subject of divine healing, declared her intention to not leave her that she might see that no medicine was used, and in a few days the cancer dried up and came out with its many ligaments like spider legs. Miss Gillilan afterwards married Rev. Dunn, a Free Methodist evangelist. Now I have lived for 37 years with a little woman who was present at the above meeting and a witness of the incident mentioned.

### Buckwheat Cakes

2 cups buckwheat flour  
1 cup flour

1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup molasses  
1 tablespoon shortening  
Sift together flours, baking powder and salt; add liquid, molasses and melted shortening; beat three minutes. Bake on hot greased griddle.

### Waffles

2 cups flour  
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup melted shortening  
Sift flour, baking powder and salt together; add milk to yolks of eggs; mix thoroughly and add to dry ingredients; add melted shortening and mix in beaten whites of eggs. Bake in well greased hot waffle iron until brown. Serve hot with maple syrup. It should take about 1 1/2 minutes to bake each waffle.
