### Coles Valley Farm Home Is Destroyed

The farm home at the Emery ranch in Coles valley was destroyed by fire last night. Mrs. Anna Emery, the only occupant, having a very narrow escape. The fire originated between 11 and 12 o'clock at night, starting on the roof probably from falling sparks. Mrs. Emery was awakened by the noise of the flames and escaped only a few moments before the roof caved in. She awakened the foreman of the ranch but the fire was so hot that it prevented their approach. Fortunately the wind was blowing away from the garage and barn and only the house and woodshed burned. The home was built about five years ago and was thoroughly modern in every particular. It was valued at approximately \$7,000 and is covered by insurance to the amount of \$1500. None of the furniture or contents of the building was saved. Mrs. Emery expects to leave for Fresno, Calif., to visit her daughter, Mrs. Margaret Price, while the home is being rebuilt.

### Roseburg Faces Gasoline Shortage

The state of Oregon at the present moment faces a severe gasoline shortage, according to word received this morning by B. L. Hyland, manager of the local Standard Oil agency. The local agency at the present time has only a few gallons on hand which will be saved for the use of the farmers who are running tractors. The Roseburg dealers have been instructed to refrain from selling until word has been received to the effect that relief is in sight. Mr. Hyland talked over long distance this morning to the Portland and San Francisco offices and they declared that a general shortage is the cause and no shipment can possibly be sent to this city for at least a week.
