EL CENTRO, Calif., May 4.—Walter Andrew Watson, alleged bigamist-murderer, was formally charged with murder here late today when a coroner's jury which held an inquest over the body of Nina Lee Deloney, which was recovered this morning from its hidden burial spot in western Imperial county, returned a verdict that "death was caused by a blow on the head by James Watson."

Prisoner Uses Needle to Escape

RAWLINS, Wyo., May 5.—With a needle obtained in the prison shirt factory as his only tool, Bert Lofton has escaped from the state prison here. William Smith, his companion, was captured while trying to scale the prison wall.

Lofton and Smith were confined to the death house cell because of their known desperate characters. Lofton found that a soft piece of steel covered a drain. With great patience and skill he slowly cut a hole thru the steel with the needle. After removing a pipe and a plate they crawled through the hole, picked the lock of a steel door connecting with the main corridor of the prison, scaled the state roof and dropped to the ground. In the prison yard they found a steel bar, which the prisoners bent into a hook, to fasten an improvised rope of the prison wall. Lofton escaped but Smith was caught by the guard.
