Cherry trees in breathless splendor, Blossoms pink and white snow; The little song birds trill with wonder Of the very soul of you.

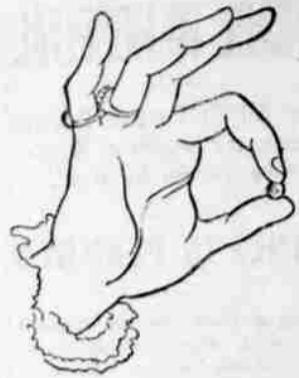
Love, can there be resurrection After winter's death-bells ring? Are we reborn, incarnated? Does life then hold forth a spring?
