County Court Hears Many Road Pleas

Road day at the county court has been one of great activity. Delegations from all parts of the county have appeared asking that immediate work be done in their localities. On account of the great cost of road construction at the present time, the court is doing only what work is necessary, but wherever needed expects to make improvements. Road work at the present time is more than double the normal cost, in fact the figures showing that one mile of standard road at the present time costs as much as two and a quarter miles formerly cost. Because of these inflated conditions, the court deems

it good economy to put off such time as is not absolutely necessary until such time as the money will buy a greater amount of work. In other words, the roads must be put in the best condition as possible, new sections being the part eliminated. Delegations requested that the court spend special and general bond money on improvements in their districts in order to get roads in shape for all year travel. The court promised to investigate and to do all possible to alleviate conditions. Delegates were received from Colfax, Garden Valley and other parts of the county.
