#### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* THE SHIPPING PROBLEM.

Increased production everywher in the west and increased congestion at many points in the east form a problem with which the Pacific coast shippers must grapple in carnest this year. Such is the constusion of experienced railroad men who have made a close study of the freight car

With the return of the railroad to private control, transportation lines generally are lending their ef-forts to catching up with the marked shortage of equipment. The South-ern Pacific has announced that most of the \$30,000,000 being expended this year in improvements will go for rolling stock and motive power, the greater portion of which will be con-atructed in the company's shops it California. While much of this equipment will be available this year the Southern Pacific for example re-ports that during the first three months of this year, it has moved 3-per cent more traffic than for the corresponding period of the year becorresponding period of the year be-fore. If this ratio of increase holds good, even with the new equipment available shippers will have to get the most use out of every car, if a serious shortage is to be averted. Western railroads are believed to be in much better shape than many lines in the east and middle west, but it is soluted out that car amonly works on pointed out that car supply works o pointed out that car supply works of the principle of an endless chain, and the delays anywhere will hold up the supply at all points. How ship-pers may help themselves in this im-portant matter is being explained by fortant matter is being explained by Southern Pacific operating and traffic men, who advocate a campaign all over the Pacific Coast for better use of cars. In the United States there are about 2,452,000 freight cars now in use. These are rolling in trains, loaded and emply only 2.03 per cent of the time. They average 11.29 per cent time loading and 11.29 per cent being unloaded, if every car is released before demurrage starts. The balance of 58.32 per cent is waste time, due to repairs, switching and unnecessary delays per cent is waste lime, due to repairs, switching and annecessary delays. One hour saved each day for each car would equal 2.452.000 car harm per day. Dividing this figure by 21 (hours per day) it is self-evident that the public would have over 102.000 additional cars to use thru this simple saving of one hour per car each day.
