Second Coming Warnings Given

SUTHERLIN, May 7.—(Special to the News-Review)—Evangelist J. A. Rippey spoke last evening on the Signs of the Times. He showed from Amos 3:7, Joel 1:14, 15; 2:1, 10-17; Revelation 13:6, 7; Jude 17, 18; 2 Peter 3:3, 4, that the Lord would warn the world before Christ would come the second time. He stated that this warning was now being given in all the world. Then he read that the Lord had given signs in the sun, moon and stars pointing to his coming, reading from Matthew 24:29, Luke 21:25, 26, Mark 13:24, Revelation 16:12-14. Then he read from Matt. 24:32-35 showing that as the swelling of the buds in spring showed that summer was nigh, so these signs, the darkening of the sun, and falling of the stars were to show that the coming of Christ was near—even at the door, and be further shown that the generation that would see these things in the light of prophecy would see the coming of Christ. From Matt. 24:37-39 he showed that as it was in the days of Noah, so it would be in the days of the coming of the Son of Man, that the majority of the people would not believe the last day message. He urged upon the people to study the prophecies of the scriptures and to walk in every ray of light that came across their pathway. Tonight Evangelist O. H. Shrewsbury will continue the study of the "Signs of the Times."

4,000,000 JEWS TO LEAVE THE U. S.

Arrangements Be Made at New York on Next Sunday and Monday.

TO NATIONAL HOMELAND

Immigrants Will Flood Palestine—Great Britain Gets Mandate—Have Been Exiled From Near East 2000 Years.

NEW YORK, May 6.—Arrangements for the gradual immigration of 4,000,000 Jews to Palestine, following the San Remo sessions of the peace conference which gave Great Britain the mandate over that country for the establishment of a Jewish national homeland, will be discussed at an extraordinary conference of the Zionist organization of America here next Sunday and Monday.

The conference, which will be attended by 1700 delegates from the United States and Canada, will be, it is said, "the most important and historic gathering of Jews ever held in America." Under the leadership of Justice Brandeis of the United States supreme court, and United States Judge Julian W. Mack, the organization is expected to take immediate action toward the re-establishment of the Jewish people in the near east after 2000 years of exile, thus bringing to pass the realization of the movement begun 23 years ago by Dr. Theodore Herzl, father of political Zionism.

In calling this extraordinary convention, which necessitated the postponement of the regular annual meeting, which had been scheduled for Atlantic City beginning May 29, the national executive said: "The historic action taken at San Remo on April 24, which gave recognition to the age-long aspirations of the Jewish people, opens up the immediate opportunity to them to conquer through work and organization that place for themselves in the world of civilization which has been their hope for twenty centuries, a place where Jewish ideals shall be free and where Jewish spirit shall be free to express itself in accordance with its traditions of social justice and righteousness."

Although millions of Jews, particularly from eastern Europe, are said to be prepared to leave at a moment's notice, the Zionists say that "no mad rush of immigrants will be permitted to flood Palestine, but that a well-regulated, scientific immigration of perhaps 50,000 annually will be undertaken, in order to insure the proper economic and cultural development of the country."

Farewell Reception For Supt. Smith

Over 300 people were present last night at the farewell reception given at the high school auditorium by the three parent-teachers' associations in the city in honor of Supt. A. G. Smith and wife. The auditorium was beautifully arranged with spruce flowers. L. G. Evans, chairman of the committee in charge of the reception, occupied the chair and gave a short talk representing the Rose school. Mr. Evans spoke of the fine work that had been done by Supt. Smith, and the high regard in which he was held by all. Similar talks were made by T. A. Raffety, representing the Benson school, and Foster Butler for the Fullerton school. The address of the evening was given by Rev. E. W. Warrington, who spoke on educational lines, expressing the idea that Supt. Smith was a high class man in his line of work, and should be a success in whatever line he elected to follow. Supt. Smith responded, expressing his appreciation of the fine spirit of co-operation among the parent-teachers' associations, and wishing the best of success to his successor, and the welfare of the Roseburg schools. A beautiful bouquet of flowers was presented to Mrs. Smith, who received the praises of each speaker for her efforts in the many duties which had fallen to her. A short musical program and readings were given, and a dainty luncheon followed by a social time.

Says Oregon Lost By Joining U. S.

Albert Abraham, candidate for U. S. senator, has returned from attending the annual celebration at Champeog where each year the historical society holds a meeting in honor of the first "election" held in Oregon, joining the Oregon country with the United States. Under the leadership of Joe Meeker, an early trapper, about 100 men, constituting the major portion of the residents of the state, met at Champeog and by a vote of 50 to 52 decided to join the

Oregon country to the United States instead of the Canadian province. At the celebration Judge P. H. D'Arcy, one of the leading jurists of the state, read the following anonymous letter received by him:

"Again we shall assemble at Champeog to celebrate the joining of the Oregon Country to the U. S. As a resident of Canada for 10 years, I would like to know if you really think the Oregon country gained anything by joining the U. S. If so, what did they gain which was any better than if they belonged to Canada today, or even as good. Please explain this in your talk and not with that 'effervescent bosh' for which American orators are noted the world over. We hope this will be the pith of your talk on May 17." The letter, Judge D'Arcy stated, purported to come from Portland and was unsigned, a sample of malicious propaganda against the government established on that day. "He belongs in Canada and not the U. S.," the speaker stated.

A. M. Knudtson, a recent arrival here from South Dakota, has accepted employment with the A. S. Huey jewelry store and will remain here permanently. Mr. Knudtson made the trip to the Pacific coast for the purpose of filing on some government land. He is an ex-service man and was overseas for 17 months with the 32nd division.
