OUR PROBLEM, TOO.

The times are moving. Whether none will say, least of all the Winchester, Mass., citizens' committee which recently conducted an inquiry into the progress of the school children of that average American residential town, says the leading paper of that city.

The committee comprised fifteen men and women of Winchester, rather able and sincere and impressed with the possibilities of the survey, who set forth to diagnose the class rooms of the public schools. For months the tongue of gossip had assailed the schools, and the committee had cartloads of criticism to consider and investigate.

It found that Winchester schools functioned perfectly to and including the seventh grade, but that satisfactory progress balked at the two upper grades and the high school, despite superior school facilities and the unremitting application of a conscientious and capable corps of teachers.

"We have found," reported the committee of fifteen, "an unsatisfactory attitude on the part of the pupils, especially in the high school, toward school work and school discipline. The wrong attitude of pupils we believe to be the principal cause of such imperfections as exist in our schools.

Let's take time to wonder, as Americans, if the school children of today can visualize the boy Lincoln sprouted at evening study before the fire, or straining long miles to borrow a book? Or if perhaps, they can visualize the big school house of those earlier days, and the rough desks that were carved with names destined to blaze in history and stand deep in granite? For Winchester's problem is that of every town and city in America in some degree.

VOTE SWINGERS.

Political evolution has developed a type of man who might be called the "vote swinger." He is a fellow with a taste for politics, a gift of gab, and an irritating manner. He keeps his ear to the ground all the year, knows the unfolding movements, and is always dropping seeds of opinion to be harvested later on.

MIGHTY DISGUSTING.

PUBLISHING DISCONTINUED.

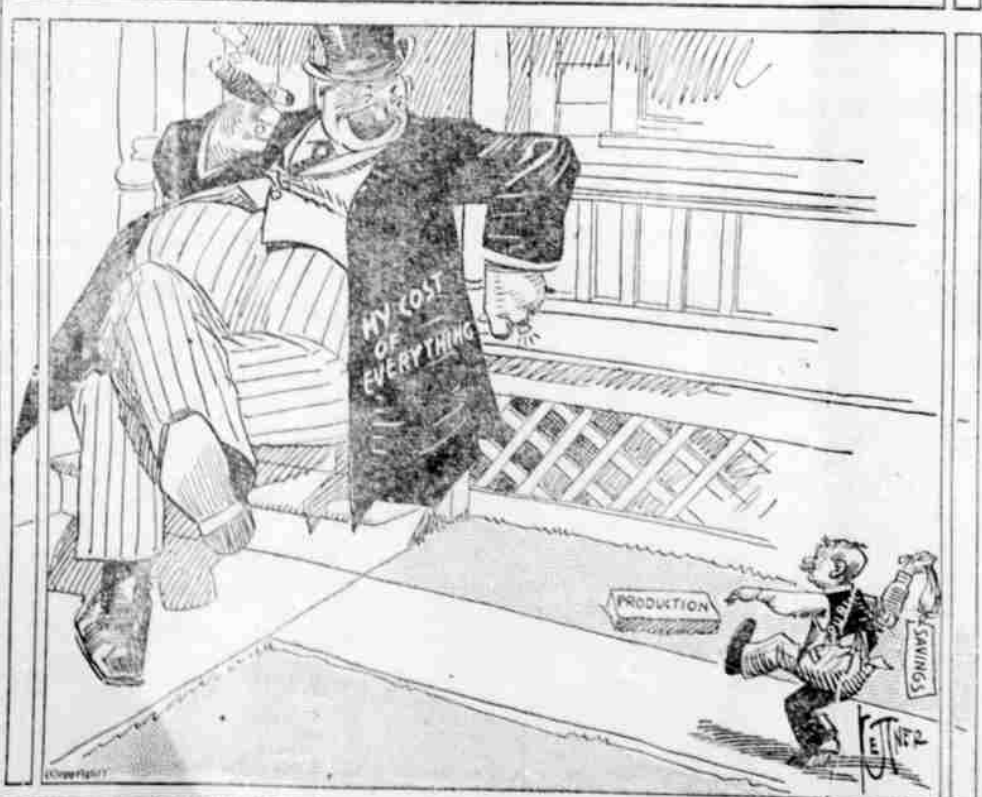
