AMERICAN DEAD TO BE RETURNED

Per Cent of U. S. Soldiers Buried in France Will Be Brought Back.

DIES BE EXHUMED

Will be Left at Request of Parents and Those Unidentified Will Not be Moved—71,000 Buried in France.

By Associated Press. PARIS, May 8.—Representatives of the American war department estimate that about 60 per cent of the American soldiers buried in France will be exhumed and taken to their native land. A little more than 77,000 American burials have been registered by the graves registration service and about 71,000 of these are in France. Not all of these soldiers will be returned to American soil as the war department proposes to carry back to America only those requested by their next of kin. This policy will result in ten-

ROAD INFORMATION IS PUBLISHED

Forest Service Sends Out Bulletins Giving Out Condition of Highways.

WORK TO BE STARTED

Cut Off Road From Tiller to Trail to be Started June 1. According to Intimation Given in Forest Service Bulletin.

The work on the Tiller-Trail road will probably be started about the first of June, is the information contained in a bulletin published by the U. S. forest service. The bulletin, which is published at regular intervals, gives complete information regarding the roads leading to vacation spots in the national forests. The Roseburg-Peel road is said to be rough, but open, and passable by all weight of cars. Autoists planning on making trips to some of the western Oregon camping spots can ascertain the condition of the road over which the trip is to be made by the following information: Mount Hood.—Open, Sandy to Cold Spring; bad condition. Cold Spring-Government Camp, closed by snow. Columbia River Highway.—Open and in good condition Portland and Viento; hard surface. Closed Viento and Hood River account asphalt being laid—passable however before 7 a. m., between 12 and 1., and after 6 p. m. Road should be paved to Hood River by June 10. Willamina-Tillamook.—Hard and dry; very rough. Row River.—Open, fair condition. Cottage Grove and Diaton. Closed Diaton and Lund Park; no detours. Should be open for autos by May 10. Roseburg-Peel.—Rough, but open. Can be traveled by any weight car. Riddle-Trail.—Open, good condition Riddle and Tiller. Closed Tiller and Trail; has never been completed here; work may start here June 1. Willamette Highway.—Open Eugene and Oakridge, poor condition. Closed Oakridge and summit. Never accessible for autos above Rigdon. Fair condition to Lowell and Reserve; fair Reserve and Oakridge. McKenzie Highway.—Open, fair condition. Eugene to Blue river. Closed Blue river and McKenzie Bridge, construction work; should be open soon to McKenzie Bridge; will be poor, however. Closed McKenzie Bridge to summit, snow. Green Springs Mountain Road.—Open, fair condition Ashland and Klamath Falls. Medford-Crater Lake.—Open, fair condition to Union Creek. Closed Union Creek and Crater Lake, snow. No detours. Should be open July 1. Crescent City-Gold Beach.—Open. Excellent from Crescent City to Brookings, Brookings to Gold Beach, passable but rough. Mud on Meyers hill. Port Orford-Gold Beach.—Open but poor. Difficult for autos. Alameda-Merlin-Grants Pass.—

Open, fairly good. Grants Pass-Crescent City.—Open. Difficult of Hays hill. Teams necessary one spot. Rough on Oregon mountain; otherwise good.

NO EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION

Practically all the education for Central African natives is in the hands of the missionaries, according to the surveys of the Interchurch World Movement, made public at the county conference. In some cases governments subsidize these schools. The generally sparse population of Africa means that greater distances must be covered by the missionary in reaching a given number of people than in other countries.

MATERIALISM OR CHRISTIANITY

In common with the Orient, said speakers at the county conference, North Africa is copying the West. The interchurch survey finds her awake, and voicing her aspirations most audibly. She is taking on a form of Western civilization, and it depends on the evangelical churches whether this form shall be Christian or materialistic in character.

Negro Churches Plan to Raise \$10,729,263 In Coming Campaign

A total of approximately \$10,729,263 included in the budget of the communions cooperating in the interchurch world movement is for the educational, missionary and benevolent work among negroes to be done by four communions whose membership aggregates more than 4,000,000 of the colored people of this country, according to speakers at the county conference held here by the movement. There are four negro denominations cooperating in the drive.

INTERCHURCH MOVEMENT TO HOLD PROGRAMIZING CONFERENCE HERE SOON

This county is due for a thorough Protestant overhauling, according to speakers at the interchurch world movement county conference representing the home survey department of the state. This department is making extensive investigations in every section of Oregon.

The survey in this county has not yet progressed far enough to furnish material for a complete report on conditions, said the representative of the survey department but when it is secured a "programizing conference" will be held to determine future church activities.

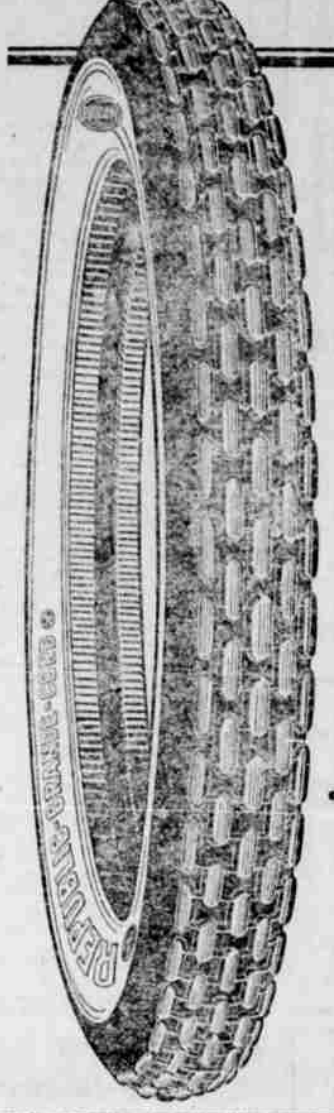
"The programizing conference in Benton county, where the surveys have been completed, shows what may be expected here," said he. "The first finding of the committee appointed to estimate and report on conditions was a declaration for a minimum wage for pastors of \$1200 and house.

"Rural communities where formerly two or more churches laboring under financial handicaps had been struggling along most unsatisfactorily were recommended to the sole care of one or another of the Protestant churches of the county, with the result that in these rural districts hereafter there are to be fewer, but

WHAT'S THE MATTER WITH CHINA?

Much that was constructive or preservative in China under the old social regime is either helpless in the face of modern problems or has itself commenced to disappear, according to the surveys of the interchurch world movement, made public at the county conference. Very little more can be said according to the survey with reference to her religions. Each of them—Confucianism, Taoism, Buddhism—contains elements of spiritual value and admirable ethical teachings which have doubtless contributed to China's strength in the past. But despite their elements of worth they have admittedly proved unequal to the task of producing the highest type of individual character or of initiating forces and movements capable of regenerating society. And this is China's all-inclusive, vital need, for she is drifting in a way that makes her a peril to herself and a menace to the world.

ing in France those whose next of kin ask that they be left here and those whose removal is not requested. It is understood also that the unidentified American dead will be left in France.

Decision by the Franco-American commission that bodies of American soldiers buried in the zone of military operations may be exhumed anytime after September 15 next ends a long period of negotiations between French and American authorities. The French government desired to meet the wishes of the American nation but entertained serious doubts as to the advisability of removing the American dead from the zone of operations this year owing to labor and transportation difficulties involving the passing of the bodies over the railways and highways at a time when the French population was in the first stage of its recovery from the economic and sentimental strain of five years of war. The French government feared that the granting of such permission to America would bring on clamorous agitation from other nations for similar permission and that this would hamper the rehabilitation of French industrial conditions. American officers, however, have vigorously urged that the number of Americans in the zone of operations was relatively small; that the traditional policy of the United States was to return its dead from foreign soil and that the American government could do no less than heed the pleas of those next of kin who insisted that the bodies of their relatives be returned to their homes.

PHOENIX, Ariz., May 6.—A uniform dress for Phoenix high school girls has been prescribed by the board of trustees. It consists of blue serge or white cotton shirts, white "middy" blouses, cotton stockings and shoes with moderate heels. This uniform was decided upon by the high school's parent-teacher association, after, it was said, girls had left school because they were unable to keep up with the tendency of schoolmates to wear expensive clothes. The wearing of the uniforms will begin with the opening of school next fall.
