ROAD INTEREST ON INCREASE

Better Road Conditions Lead to Enthusiasm In Improvement Programs

MUCH ACTIVITY SHOWN

Tourist Trade Has Been Found Well Worth Going After and Great Efforts Are Put Forth to Reap the Benefits.

Better road conditions throughout the northwest together with well marked, definite routes of travel to the scenic regions have caused increased interest in all classes of motor travel, according to Chas. S. Heinline of this city, who is the local representative of the National Parks highway. Mr. Heinline has kept in close touch with road building progress and is an enthusiast over the beneficial results from improved highways.

"All along the National Parks highway from Chicago to its western terminus at Crater lake, Oregon, there has been unusual activity in road construction during the past two years," said Mr. Heinline. "Naturally, representatives of the big highway system are boosters for good roads and, being consistent boosters, they now take great satisfaction in seeing how communities have waked up to the desirability of improved avenues of reaching their several cities and towns.

"Motorist trade has been found well worth going after. Travelers by auto spend money everywhere. One motorist may stop in this city over night, while another will go on and stop in the next place, but a constant stream of dollars is spread along the route and where one man buys a tire in one city, another will perhaps have his tank filled and still another will buy some needed article. This trade is invariably cash—a most desirable feature.

"The benefits, however, are not confined to the money distributed. It has been found that the lure of good roads, or perhaps a should say, better roads, brings increased motor travel and travelers spread the fame of those communities which improve their roads. The fact that the city or county has sufficient community spirit to see the desirability of better road building often indirectly attracts investments because men of capital are impressed by those places which show community spirit whether it be a matter of road building, parks, schools or anything of a civic nature.

"The National Parks highway is now well marked almost for its entire length. We confidently expect an even greater travel this year than we had in 1919, which broke all previous records."
