PRUNE DISEASE IS MANILA BROWN ROT

Strange Disease Which Baffled Growers Diagnosed by Professor Zeller.

SPRAY WILL CONTROL

Infection Comes From Surroundings and is Fostered by Continued Cold and Damp Weather in Early the Spring.

Manila Brown Rot is the disease which has made its appearance in the prune orchards of Douglas county, according to Prof. S. M. Zeller, of Oregon Agricultural college, who has been spending a couple of days in this county studying the infection which has become quite prevalent over the entire county. Prof. Zeller is one of the leading authorities on plant diseases and states that the rot is due to the protracted cold, wet weather and from lack of care in cleaning out surroundings.

The disease first made its appearance at Days Creek, where the infected twigs threatened to destroy the entire trees. It started from some seedling pear trees which were not given care and spread rapidly through the entire community. It has been found in more scattered sections but in most places is said to have resulted from infected trees and lack of care in cleaning out surroundings.

The Manila brown rot is a malignant form and must be controlled in the same manner as other forms of brown rot. If left alone it will kill trees and completely destroy an orchard. The twigs die back to the branches and girdle them, thus causing the loss of entire limbs.

It can be stamped out by spray and by cleaning up the orchard. Infected parts should be cut away and burned. Seedling trees, dead brush and all forms of growth which harbor the disease should be cut away from the orchard and destroyed by fire. Orchards where the infection has made its appearance will be closely watched and the owners will be directed in their efforts to gain control over the disease by competent authority.

Prof. Zeller and County Fruit Inspector Armstrong are spending several days visiting the various orchards throughout the county and are checking up the damage done by the cold weather and by the long wet spell. Prof. Zeller states that the fruit in this valley appears to be in much better condition than other sections and if kept free from disease a good crop will doubtless result.

The disease which is now in the county is not dangerous if proper care is taken and close watch is kept on the orchards. It has been found frequently previous to this time but only in isolated cases. Cold, wet weather fosters its growth and spread and as a result of the early spring weather it has assumed a malignant form in the county and should be given careful care by the growers.

Prof. Zeller will remain in the county for a number of days, making investigations which it is hoped will result in benefit to the growers of the community. Prof. Black of the college is also here continuing his prune borer experiments and hopes soon to find a more satisfactory method of ridding orchards of that pest than now exist.
