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America's Trade Problem Be Solved

SAN FRANCISCO, May 8.—America's new world trade problems are to be discussed at the National foreign trade convention to be held here May 12-15 under the auspices of the National Foreign Trade Council. "The Effect of Being a Creditive Nation," will be the convention theme. American foreign traders, importers and exporters, from all the states, from ten nations on the Pacific and from parts of Europe are expected to attend. Convention officials expect between 2500 and 3000 delegates.

Importance is attached by the officials to this year's convention for they say, it will be confronted with problems encountered in the first big

Year of the new American merchant marine operating in the first year of open world trade competition since 1914.

Among the convention session topics will be "Fundamentals of Our Foreign Trade," "Financing Foreign Trade," "Foreign Trade Policies," "Need for a Bargaining Tariff," "Banking Service to Foreign Trade," "The General Press and the Foreign Trade," "American Trade With Russia," and "The Merchant Marine."

James A. Farrell, New York, chairman of the National Foreign Trade Council and president of the United States Steel corporation, will preside. Among speakers scheduled are W. C. Redfield, former secretary of commerce; Captain Robert Dollar, San Francisco shipping man; William Sitoula, president Southern Pacific railway company; Dr. Henry Suzzallo, president University of Washington, Seattle; R. M. Collins, vice president Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway company; J. S. Drum, first vice president American Bankers' association; W. L. Saunders, president American Manufacturers' Export association, and Dr. David P. Barrows, president University of California.

This year's convention will be the seventh held by the council. Last year's meeting was in Chicago. Detroit and New Orleans want the 1921 meeting.

CREAMERY PUTS IN MODERN SYSTEM

Refrigerator Plant Will Be Installed By Middle of Present Month.

TO INCREASE CAPACITY

Freezing Room Where Ice Cream May Be Kept at Constant Zero Temperature Will be Installation in This County.

A complete refrigeration system is being installed by the Douglas county creamery on Jackson street and when completed it will make this factory one of the best equipped outside of Portland. The plant will then have a capacity of 1000 gallons of ice cream each day in addition to its regular output of butter.

Workmen are now busily engaged in constructing the cooling tower and the installing engineer arrived today to put in the machinery, the bases for which have been constructed for some time. The machinery arrived only recently and represents a financial outlay of several thousand dollars.

A large compressor will be set up and will be operated by a 15-horsepower electric motor. This will supply a freezing room, the temperature of which will be kept automatically at zero. Ice cream will be frozen in this room and with the constant temperature provided automatically by the device being installed will be more thoroughly frozen and more evenly frozen than is possible under the present methods.

The apparatus also makes possible the keeping of ice cream in perfect condition and will prevent the formation of ice particles caused by melting and re-freezing.

A butter storage room will also be constructed and will be kept at a temperature of 32 degrees, making storage conditions for butter ideal. A cooling system will also be installed to quickly lower the temperature of the pasteurized cream from which the butter is made and in this manner the capacity will be greatly increased.

The company already maintains its own ice plant but with the installation of the refrigeration system the consumption of ice will be reduced to a very low minimum.

With the new apparatus it is expected that the capacity of the plant will be approximately 1000 gallons of ice cream each day. It is planned to manufacture small, round bricks for individual service and these will be made in all flavors. Ice cream

will be sold in any desired quantities and will be made up in attractive forms.

At the present time the local factory is completely unable to supply the demand that comes to it for ice cream. It has six agencies in Josephine county, two in Lane county and one or more in practically every city and town in Douglas county. It is expected that the work will take only a week or ten days. It is hoped to have the system in full operation by the middle of the month, when the demands for ice cream will begin to increase rapidly.
