Roseburg Men Killed In Wreck

mediately devoted themselves to getting the badly hurt ones out of the wrecked coaches.

R. A. Bland, engineer of train 107 from Portland, escaped serious injury. His nose was broken and he was badly bruised but he was able to walk from the ambulance into the hospital.

His escape from death and the fact that no persons were killed in the leading car of his train, and comparatively few injured was due probably to the fact that the two trains met at a slight angle, train 107 being just at the finish of the curve while the leading car of train 124 had not quite started to turn the curve.

Car Lifted Into Air.
This outboard car was raised and slid along the floor of the other, the lives of its occupants being saved by this fact.

After the collision, this car, tilted at an angle, rested against a trolley wire pole, which was bent over but did not break. This saved the car from falling on its side. About an hour after the wreck, about the time the wrecking train arrived, this pole began to crack and settle outward.

There was grave danger that the post would break and the car topple over on throngs of people who by this time had flocked to the wreck. An effort was made to get them away, but regardless of the danger they still crowded around. There also were men still working to get the body of the dead engineer out of the debris, so a guy wire was fastened to the pole and fastened on the bank above.

A pathetic feature of several of the deaths and injuries was that had train 124 stopped at Bertha station, as it was under orders to do, these persons would have left the train there to go to their homes.

SKUNK SKINS NO LONGER AVAILABLE

Uncle Sam's Letters Not to Be Contaminated By Hide's Aroma.

IS ANNOUNCED TODAY

No Way to Make a Skunk Skin Respect Radiating Atmosphere so the Lid is Put on and a Strict Embargo Placed.

The skin of the odoriferous skunk has been outlawed from the United States mails, according to an edict recently issued by the general superintendent of the railway mail service and announced at the Roseburg post office today. This order implies the official decision that, aside from the scientific process that produces a desirable fur for millinery's display, there is no way to compel a skunk skin to respect radiating atmosphere or the sensitive nostrils of fastidious humanity, not to mention large quantities of miscellaneous mail matter and mail bags with which it would come in contact while in transit. In accordance with the order, skunk skins will no longer be accepted for mailing at the local post office or by the rural route carriers.

Originally, the acceptance of skunk skins dates back to the time when merchandise of practically all forms was admissible to the mails. With that democracy of association, they enjoyed just as much privilege as talcum powder, toilet soaps, perfumery, roses and violet-scented love-letters. As the time went on, however, it became necessary to "restrain" them to the extent of protecting other classes of mail which preferred their own company, so the post office department issued an order barring from the mails such skins as gave forth evidence of their identity or were enclosed in containers splashed with grease.

But as "iron bars do not a prison make," no wrapper could be devised that would prevent the escape of the tell-tale aroma. After exposure in the outer air for a considerable period, the skins, upon being presented for mailing, would not immediately protest, but after brief confinement it would let loose an atmospheric barrage that ended only with liberation at the fur factory. Thus it came to pass that Uncle Sam decided that the only way to eliminate the objectionable odor from the mails was to eliminate the skin itself.

He found his wife in her room partially unconscious from the effects of the drug and was successful in reviving her. It is also

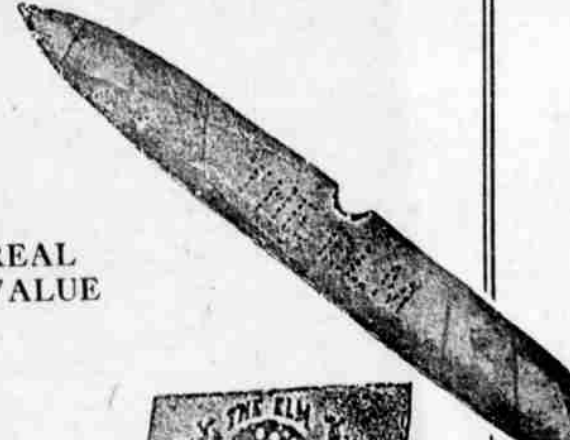
