The following subscription rates become effective April 1, 1920, for the News-Review:

FOR SELF PRESERVATION.

The recent increase in subscription price and advertising rates of newspapers has put publishers on the defensive against the charge of being profiteers.

But other increases in cost have to be met, which are peculiar to the newspaper at the same time that they are exceptionally heavy.

The greatest burden, however, of the newspaper, is the result of the recent unprecedented leap in the price of newsprint paper.

The price of newsprint today is \$200 a ton in England, 250 in Sweden, and \$300 in France, and for transient lots, \$250 in the United States.

Increases in subscription and advertising rates are, therefore, compulsory. While such increases in rates have not generally been anywhere near in proportion to the increased production costs, it is a mistake to assume that the newspaper's income is increased to the full extent of its increase in subscription and advertising rates.

Every increase in advertising space means more newsprint, more postage, more composition cost—all on an enormously increased basis.

Increase in newspaper subscription and advertising rates is, therefore, not a profiteering device on the part of the publishers. It is a necessary means of self-preservation.

TOURISTS WILL GET NO COMFORT

Those Looking For "Before The War" Conditions Will Be Disappointed.

THINGS NOT THE SAME

Passports, Etc., Will Add to His Troubles and Make Life "One Darned Thing After Another" During Stay Abroad.

THE HAGUE, May 11.—The thousands of American tourists, who are expected to visit Europe this summer, will be disappointed if they look forward to all the comforts of the days before the war.

Passports and passport visas are necessary everywhere. Even to make the four-hour trip from The Hague, Holland, to Brussels, Belgium, requires days of preparation, and the days generally lengthen into weeks if one expresses the most extraordinary whim to make a round trip, or several round trips.

An American, for instance, having obtained in the United States a Dutch visa which permits him to land in Holland for a brief stay, desires to go to Brussels—just five hours away.

Desiring to go to Belgium, he must first go to his own legation or consulate, to have his American passport amended so as to be valid in Belgium.

Even when he gets aboard the train, which may be so overcrowded that even with a first-class ticket he may have to ride in a second or third-class compartment, his troubles are far from ended.

Rapid progress is being made, particularly in Belgium, to restore railway traffic to normal, but the shortage of equipment, due to war losses, or shortage of coal, due both to strikes and war, has reduced the number of trains operated to a figure far below that of before the war and all generally are overcrowded.

Lodge Is Chosen For Chairman

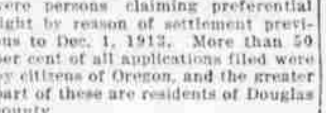
By Associated Press. CHICAGO, Ill., May 10.—Senator Lodge was today chosen to be the temporary chairman of the republican national convention here June 8.
