May Waive Gas Law In Oregon

SALEM, May 10.—The fishing industry on the Columbia river will be tied up and farming operations in eastern Oregon will be seriously handicapped unless there is relief from the gasoline shortage, according to appeals received today by governor Olcott from Astoria and The Dalles.

Governor Olcott said that doubtless the conference in Portland today attended by O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, and state sealer of weights and measures, W. A. Dziel, deputy state sealer and representatives of the fuel companies would decide to waive for a time the operation of the law requiring a specific gravity of 36 for gasoline used in the state.

2300 Prophetic Days Discussed

SUTHERLIN, May 11.—(Special to News-Review).—The lectures in the academy hall have been well attended the past two evenings. Evangelist Rippey has been speaking on the eighth and ninth chapters of Daniel. He read that the beasts in the eighth chapter represented the Medo-Persian, Grecian and Roman kingdoms. He dwelt particularly upon the work that the little horn would do, how that he would trample the truth of God to the ground. Dwelling upon the fourteenth verse of the eighth chapter, "Unto two thousand three hundred days shall the sanctuary be cleansed," Mr. Rippey showed very conclusively that these 2300 days were figurative and that they meant literally 2300 years. He read from the ninth chapter and the 23rd verse that we were to begin to count this period of time from the going forth of the commandment to restore and build Jerusalem, which, reading from Ezra the sixth and seventh chapters, he showed was 457 B. C., and adding 2300 years to this date would take us to 1844 A. D., the time of the cleansing of the sanctuary, or the beginning of the investigative judgment, whose hours we are now living in. This is the longest line of prophecy in the Bible.

Tomorrow evening Evangelist Shrewsbury will talk on "The Judgment."

Ukulele Not Hawaiian Instrument

HONOLULU, T. H.—The ukulele, known as the Hawaiian national instrument, is not Hawaiian at all, but Portuguese, says Mrs. Rose Alan, writing in the Hawaiian Educational Review, an official publication of the territorial department of public instruction.

"The ukulele," said Mrs. Alan in an article on musical development in Hawaii, "was evolved from a Portuguese from the five-stringed tarapatch fiddle, which was brought here by Portuguese immigrants. The guitar was introduced at the same time, but the use of the steel bar, instead of fingers on the keyboard, was the invention of a Hawaiian boy, Joseph Kekaku."

"As to Hawaiian singing," Mrs. Alan continued, "according to present standards of music, no such thing existed two generations ago. The only Hawaiian music in the early 60's and prior to that was the guttural, also called a mele or chant, with a limited scale of four notes. The only other singing was at religious or educational exercises and then the sound was an ear-jarring jargon, worse than the musical efforts of a Chinese congregation."

From this foundation Mrs. Alan traced the musical development of the islands which she characterized as "little less than marvelous."

Science Combats Living Costs

SEATTLE, Wash., May 11.—How science is successfully attacking the high cost of living will be told at the fourth annual meeting of the Pacific division of the American Association for the Advancement of Science here June 17 to 19.

Some of the country's foremost scientists will attend the gathering and 14 affiliated scientific societies will hold meetings here at the same time.

One feature will be a symposium of the combined affiliated societies on "The plant and animal resources of the North Pacific Ocean."

"In this year of political activity when personalities and the transitory issues of a presidential campaign are apparently crowding other interests from the public mind," said W. W. Sargeant, of San Francisco, secretary of the association's Pacific division, in announcing the meeting, "it is reassuring to know that the fundamentals are not being neglected; that the war against ignorance, the arch enemy of man, is being fought by these devotees of research, that plant diseases are being studied and insect life investigated, and chemical reactions are being noted in order that the productivity of our farms may be increased and our forests conserved."

"Astronomy, physics and chemistry still have ardent students who the seeking out new laws of nature, new stores of energy that may be adapted to the uses of man. Here indeed is an attack on the high cost of living, the results of which can confidently be predicted."

Medicine Shortage Reported In Moscow

WARSAW.—Advices from Moscow state that in March there was a great dearth of nearly all kinds of medicines in the Russian city and that many drug stores had been compelled to close. Scarcity of wood and coal was also reported, the information received here indicating that numerous frame houses and various other buildings of wood were being demolished to be used as fuel.

A Pole who came from Moscow within the last few weeks said that while food was terribly expensive there was plenty for those who had rubles which were worth, estimated in American money, a fraction more than one cent. A shave cost 75 rubles and soap 800 rubles a pound. Cigarettes were worth about 70 rubles each and matches 100 rubles a box.

Horse meat sold for 350 rubles a pound, beef bringing 450 rubles for the same weight. Pork was 1000 rubles a pound. Black bread retailed at 250 rubles a pound, butter 2,500 and fat 2000 per pound.

Sugar brought 1500 a pound when obtainable and salt was nearly always to be had at 750 rubles a pound.

Clothing for men and women was so expensive that the poorer classes either made their own suits or wore patched garments which they had owned for years.

Should Conserve Wild Flowers

CORVALLIS, May 11.—Why not conserve in picking wild flowers? Great waste of native plants and wild flowers has been brought about by careless picking.

"We pull up the flowers by the roots and then throw them away as if they were baubles and cost no life process in the production," was the remark of Dr. L. H. Bailey, noted author of horticultural books.

Fragile and quick wilting flowers will not last long and when one reaches home they have lost their beauty beyond repair. Not only is there an actual waste of flowers, but the woods are bereft of a great source of attraction for others who also want a share of flowers. There is no harm in picking a moderate number of them, especially of the more common ones, but there is harm done where the flowers are pulled up by their roots and where shrubs are butchered by twisting off twigs.

Societies for the protection of native plants advise one to keep the woods as natural as possible. The roots are of no use to the person who wants flowers for their beauty, and in their removal a source of multiplication of the plant has been destroyed. The bulb of the angel slipper, an orchid, comes out of the leaf-mold very easily and when it is taken up there is nothing left in the ground to reproduce another one in its place.
