Bluebeard Watson Killed 9 Wives

LOS ANGELES, May 11.—The nine murders to which "Bluebeard" Watson or Holden, who was yesterday sentenced to life imprisonment in San Quentin, had confessed were: Nina Lee Delaney of Eureka, Mont., married in San Francisco, December 5, 1919, struck on the head with a hammer and smothered in a blanket at Signal Hill, near Long Beach, Los Angeles county, January 16, 1920, buried on a rocky mountain side in Imperial valley, where the grave was pointed out by the murderer himself to establish the crime in Los Angeles county so he might receive a life sentence in California, in accordance with an alleged agreement with the district attorney and escape extradition to and a possible death sentence in the state of Washington.

Elizabeth Prior of Wallace, Idaho, married March 25, 1919, at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho; skull crushed with a sledge hammer and body buried near Plum Station, Wash., where it was found.

Alice M. Ludvigson of Seattle, married at Port Townsend, Wash., October 6, 1917; drowned under heavy logs in the St. Joe river, Idaho.

Agnes Wilson of Calgary, Alberta, Canada, married at Vancouver, September 20, 1918; drowned in Lake Washington.

Beatrice Andrewartha of Calgary, married at Tacoma, February 19, 1919; drowned in Lake Washington. Eleanor Fraser of Calgary, Alberta, Canada, married in Seattle, 1919; thrown into the Spokane river near Spokane, believed by the murderer to have been carried over the falls and crushed on the rocks below.

Marie Austin of Calgary, beaten with a rock and drowned in Lake Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.

Mrs. M. A. Watt, box 793, Winnipeg, Canada; drowned in Lake Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.

Gasoline Supply Limited Here

With everyone with any variety of motor vehicle from a tin lizzie to a tractor clamoring for gasoline, and with none at hand, the local Standard oil station came near reaching the "tearing their hair" stage this morning, but late this afternoon a small car of gasoline arrived in the city, and will be spotted and unloaded this evening. However, the car is not of the usual size, and contains only a small amount as compared with what could be used here. Two more cars have passed Spokane en route to this city but will not arrive for several days. The manager of the local plant has arranged a schedule which it is hoped will make the gasoline go as far as possible for legitimate purposes. Physicians will have their tanks filled as often as necessary, and the farmers will also be supplied. It is said now that many tractors are standing idle owing to the shortage. Trucks for commercial purposes will also receive a small supply. Pressure cars will receive only a very small amount for the next few days, it being the intention of the plant here to keep them supplied with two gallons, and no more, and it is advisable for everyone to use the precious fluid only when necessary, so that the limited supply will last until reinforcements arrive.

Roseburgerites Can Get Hotel Rooms

W. J. Weaver, manager of the Umpqua hotel, today received a letter from Ray W. Clark, publicity manager of the Multnomah hotel in Portland and which will be of interest to anyone intending to visit the Portland Rose Festival in June. The letter is as follows: "Referring to our conversation Monday, I beg to say that I talked with E. E. Larrimore, manager of the Liberty hotel in Vancouver, Washington, and was informed that he at present had not contracted for any rooms during the month of June, and he would be glad to handle any Roseburg visitors during that time, providing they would communicate with him at the earliest possible date. Hoping this will be of benefit to you and your people of Roseburg."

U. S. Concerned Over Mexico Fight

EL PASO, May 11.—The activities of the Carranza forces in the Tampico region which itself is in the hands of the rebels, is causing the United States government considerable concern, according to a dispatch from the agents of the Mexican revolution at Washington to the revolutionists here.

While advices are coming thru from Mexico on the revolutionary situation are fragmentary and conflicting, they cast considerable doubt on the reports that Carranza has been made prisoner.

Many prominent physicians from all parts of the county arrived in Roseburg last night and this morning and are in attendance today on the twenty-ninth annual meeting of the Southern Oregon Medical association. The sessions arranged for the morning and afternoon meetings are very interesting and profitable, and much interest is being displayed. The meetings are being held in the Elks' temple. A luncheon with appropriate speeches was held at the Umpqua hotel at noon today, and was largely attended. The meeting place for next year, as well as the election of officers will be held today.

Realty Board to Meet Tonight

A very short meeting of the Roseburg Realty Board was held in the office of Lawrence and Cordell last night, and several matters were taken up and discussed. The meeting was adjourned in a short time, to allow the members of the organization to attend the merchants' association meeting. A special called meeting of the realty board will be held this evening at 7:30, and at this time the members will enter fully into the gasoline situation here, the causes of the shortage and what can be done by them to prevent a recurrence. It is their intention to take up the matter of inducing one of the independent oil corporations to establish a plant in this city.

Merchants Hold Good meeting

A well attended meeting of the Roseburg Merchants' association was held last night and several matters of importance given consideration. A resolution opposing the extending of the Crater lake park to include Diamond lake was passed and a copy ordered forwarded to the Oregon delegation requesting them to use their influence to keep the lake and territory immediately surrounding under the jurisdiction of the forest service. The matter of the coming of the automobile caravan was discussed and it was arranged that the cars shall be parked on Main street between Washington and Lane sts. The intersections will be kept open but no cars will be allowed to travel north or south on Main street during the time the caravan is in this city. Dean Bubar, Mose Rice and Earl Pickens were appointed by the association to represent that body to co-operate with three other committeemen to be appointed by Mayor Hamilton. It was also voted to close all business establishments during the afternoon of Friday, May 21, election day, which will be the first day of the Twilight league series. Two pick-up teams of merchants will play a preliminary, followed by the main event.
