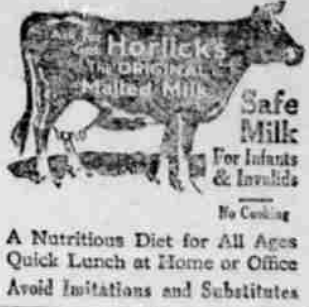

Bureau Meets at Olalla Today

C. J. Hurd, agricultural agent, Prof. E. D. Fitts and Prof. O. M. Nelson, of the Agricultural college, left this morning for Olalla to address an all-day farm bureau meeting to be held at that place today. A basket luncheon was served at noon and the program was continued into the afternoon. Mr. Hurd spoke on farm bureau matters, Prof. Fitts on dairying, and Prof. Nelson on the sheep industry. On Saturday a similar meeting will be held at Camas Valley and on Monday at Elkton. F. A. Goff, from Elkton, reports great interest in the coming meeting at that place and predicts that a very large audience will be in attendance.

Johnson at Outs With Atty. Abraham

The Portland Oregonian has the following to say:
Albert Abraham, of Roseburg, has been given the cold shoulder by the Johnson management in Oregon, and in California, too, since he announced himself as a candidate for United States senator on an anti-league of nations platform. Up to the time Mr. Abraham filed his candidacy, he was the Douglas county director of the Johnson campaign, and he had been asked to introduce Senator Johnson when the latter was expected to campaign personally in Oregon.
Now it is all over between the Johnson management and Mr. Abraham, and although Mr. Abraham doesn't like the league of nations any more than does Senator Johnson, the management of the latter declines, firmly but positively, to have Mr. Abraham hooked up with the senator.
Four years ago Mr. Abraham forced the name of C. E. Hughes on the republican primary ballot in Oregon which was the opening wedge in bringing about the nomination of Mr. Hughes at Chicago.

Argument to be Heard June 16

The famous Klamath Falls court house case will be argued here on June 16, according to Judge J. W. Hamilton, who recently presided over the hearing held at Klamath Falls, where the evidence in the case was introduced. The argument was set for today but on account of the transcript being incomplete, no argument will be heard until the date in June. Klamath Falls at present has three court houses. One enterprising judge and his followers built a court house on one site, and was enjoined from occupying it by the opponents who then succeeded in electing a judge of their opinion and building another one. He was subsequently enjoined from moving the seat of government and with two pretentious structures the old building is still used.

Plumbers Meet At Salem Today

SALEM, Ore., May 14.—Trade extension will be one of the important subjects to be taken up at the nineteenth annual convention of the Oregon State Association of Master Plumbers, which opens here today and closes tomorrow night with a banquet. Salem today greeted the plumbers with the usual hospitality of the capital city.

Among the speakers scheduled to address the convention are William J. Woolley, of the trade extension bureau; Harry L. Hanson, of Montana; and Frank J. Kilham, of California; the latter both members of the board of directors of the national association. Other prominent men from California and Washington are expected.

Another subject scheduled to be brought before the convention, it is said, will be additional laws for the improvement of sanitary conditions throughout the state. The plumbers, to whom belongs the credit for this country's lead in sanitation, still are after better laws for sanitation, and new ideas are expected to be offered the convention for its consideration.

The officers of the association are Charles Fullman, Portland, president; W. N. Smith, Astoria, vice-president; Ernest G. Ruedy, Portland, treasurer; T. J. Rowe, Portland, secretary.

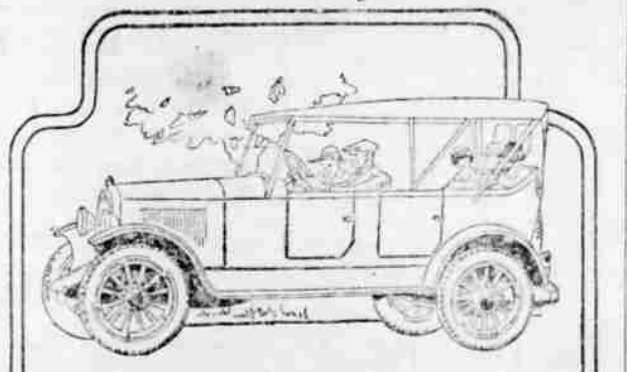

Suit is brought.

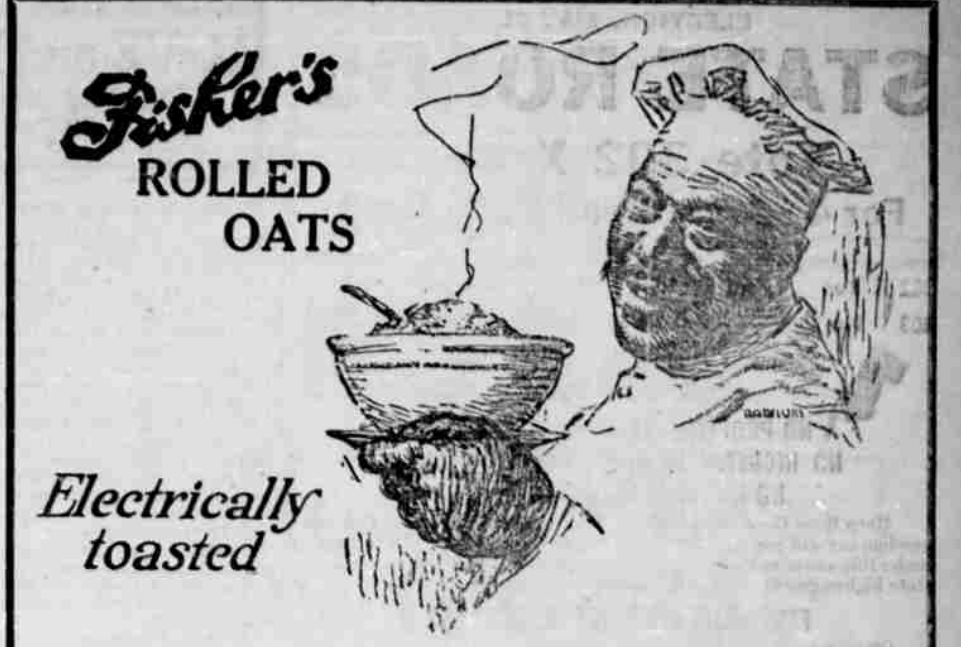
