Caravan Will Not Stop In Roseburg

The Northwestern Automobile Caravan, making the run over the Pacific highway from Seattle to Stockton, Calif., will not stop in Roseburg as previously planned, according to a telegram received by the Chamber of Commerce this morning. It had been expected that the caravan would stop in Roseburg at noon on Wednesday but arrangements have now been made to go directly through the city. The caravan will be accompanied by a number of army men who will remain in this city long enough to answer any questions ex-serve men may have regarding insurance, allotments, bonuses, back pay, etc. Corporal Henry Guinness, of Eugene, of the general recruiting service, spent the day in the city announcing the coming of the caravan which will remain for only a few minutes. It may be the case that the caravan will be postponed because of the gasoline shortage unless arrangements can be made. Up to the present time it has been impossible to get assurances of gasoline throughout the state and unless the situation is cleared within a few days the trip may be postponed indefinitely. A ship-truck demonstration will be made simultaneously from Portland and trucks will be operated between Portland and Eugene in a monster parade. A large number of trucks representing all different makes will participate in this demonstration.

Each single bit of his career acted as a stepping stone to his great achievement. Perhaps he was born under a lucky star. Anyway, he was fortunate enough to be the son of an actor and received an early training in mimicry, juggling and acrobatics. He mastered some of these arts before he had finished the third reader. After leaving school he traveled with his father and became more efficient in the art of entertaining. Then followed the period in the vaudeville business as a comedian. This developed his relative ability and prepared him to write his own comedies. It also taught him to forsake the well beaten path and search in the byways for new material. A comedian must be original. Thus, Larry Semon is perhaps the best qualified for the title of comedy king. All of his past experiences can be utilized upon the screen. He can resort to thrilling acrobatics where the screen comedian is forced to use his wit. He is also adept in training animals and has a cat, monkey and six little mice that play different roles in his comedy. During the three years previous to 1922, Albert E. Smith, president of Vitaphone, was agreed in making \$25,000 on Larry Semon in the production of 25 new comedies. "The Grocery Clerk," which is something different from the usual run of laugh makers, was the first. It is being produced under the new contract. "Between the Acts," "New Day, Day" and "The Head Waiter" are some of Larry Semon's comedies that stand out prominent as being in a class by themselves.
