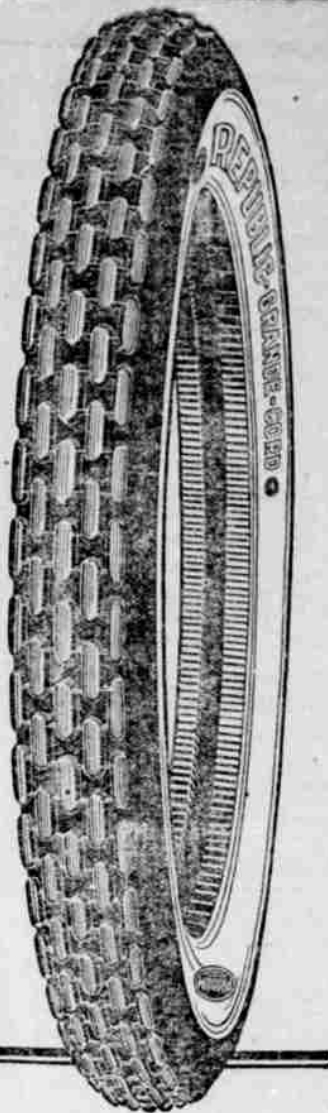

Harold Howell Take The Stand

COQUILLE, May 13.—After Captain Craddock, of the Portland police department, Sam Whetstone, of Coquille, and George Washington Tribbey, street commissioner of Marshfield, had concluded their evidence yesterday regarding the bullet that killed Lillian Leuthold and the gun owned by Harold Howell, there was little new found to have been obtained. The general impression being that the state had substantially shown a great similarity between the gun that was used to kill the little victim and the gun Harold Howell owns and which was introduced in evidence.

The evidence of Officer Tucker related mainly to the gun of Harold Howell, which the state claims was the instrument used to cause Lillian Leuthold's death. Officer Tucker said that in his talk with the boy prisoner he had been informed by the accused youth the gun was .22 caliber, but that Harold Howell had not said anything at all about the rifle being reloaded. Coroner Wilson said he had asked at the Howell home to be shown all of the weapons in the house. In the lot was the gun now on exhibit in court. Nothing had been told regarding the fact the weapon had been reloaded.

Broken Journal Causes Wreck

The committee of railroad officials and citizens appointed to investigate the recent freight wreck in the suburbs of Eugene has just made public its findings, says the Eugene Guard. The report goes on to state that the freight train designated as Extra 2515, consisting of 50 cars, was in charge of Engineer E. W. Sharp, Fireman J. G. Hunter and Conductor J. H. Rankin, none of whom had been on duty in excess of the regular hours, that the train was running at approximately 12 miles an hour when, at a point near mile post 646 Journal No. 4 on S. P. car No. 53327 broke at a point about six inches inside the collar.

The dropping of the axle upon the ties caused the overturning of this car and the derailment of four other loaded cars, the total damage to the five being estimated at \$2155. The overturned car was a steel gondola of 50-ton capacity, loaded with lime rock to a gross weight of 155,680 pounds.

Investigation showed that the broken journal was first noticed running hot at Drain, where it was re-packed and cooled. It was again inspected and refilled at Comstock and at Cottage Grove, the boxing showing no evidence of overheating at that point. Owing to the fact it received no further attention it became overheated between that place and Eugene, in which the running time was from 20 to 30 miles an hour.
