Outlook For Prunes: County Fruit Inspector E. C. Armstrong returned to the city Sunday morning following a week's trip through Kellogg, Elkhart and the northern part of the county. Mr. Armstrong inspected fruit conditions at many of the large orchards and stated upon his return that, generally speaking, the outlook for a good fruit crop there is good. Although the prospects do not point to a bumper prune crop it will be of average size all through the county is the opinion of Inspector Armstrong, who has spent some time investigating. He also stated that the apple trees do not seem to be blooming heavily and the outlook there in that line is not so good.

Making Road Improvement: The force service has started making improvements near Pool on the Little River road. A small bridge

is to be moved and a section of the road changed in location to eliminate a grade and turn. Several hundred dollars will be spent in this work. The county is also making improvements on the same road.

Plyler, the Noble Grand of Roseburg Rebekah Lodge, the officers of the lodge and their families enjoyed a beautiful picnic dinner yesterday in the beautiful grove at the Roberts creek schoolhouse. There were about 50 persons present and the afternoon was very happily spent.

Ball Game Sunday: The town baseball teams of Oakland and Myrtle Creek met at Oakland Sunday afternoon, the game resulting in a victory for Oakland. The final score was 19 to 4. A large crowd from Myrtle Creek, Oakland and Youcalla was present and although the game was somewhat one-sided much interest was displayed.

Motor to Oakland: Many motorists spent Sunday in the vicinity of Oakland or went to that city for the purpose of having Sunday dinner at the Deardriff boarding house. "Today's Housewife" will not be issued in June, and the "Broadside and Sportsman" and "The Broadside" have been discontinued altogether.
