

DEDICATE MEMORIAL TO WAR VETERANS

Huge Amphitheater In Arlington Cemetery Opened With Ceremonies.

ONLY KIND IN WORLD

Structure was Built at Cost of \$825,000—Is Among Graves of Thousands of Nation's Dead—Near the Maine Memorial.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, May 15.—To the memory of the soldiers and sailors who fought the battles of the United States in all wars, a great memorial amphitheater was dedicated today in Arlington national cemetery.

procession of army, navy and marine corps detachments, veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic and allied organizations, Spanish War veterans and World War veterans led by Major General Nelson A. Miles (retired) preceded the ceremonies. The dedicatory exercises were under the auspices of the Grand Army of the Republic to whose efforts credit is given for the inception of the memorial and for 18 years of work for it. Secretary Baker, Secretary Daniels, both members of the commission which had charge of the construction of the memorial; and Colonel D. M. Hall, of Columbus, O., commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, were the principal speakers.

Homeseekers Ask Many Questions

After almost a year of hard work, excellent returns are being received from Canada by the Chamber of Commerce. During his work with the Chautauqua, Secretary C. S. Heston spent several weeks in Canada and learned a great deal of the country. Upon taking over the Chamber of Commerce work he made a statement which was reiterated at the recent meeting to the effect that it would take at least nine months to get returns from the advertising campaign put out. His prediction proved correct, for the Chamber of Commerce has just recently begun receiving answers to the many articles of information sent out. Many of the letters received ask questions which call for a great deal of time to answer, it being necessary to use the telephone a great deal to get in communication with persons possessing the desired facts. One of these letters follows:

Little Woody, Sask., May 2, 1920. The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce Dear Sir: I am reading one of your booklets of Douglas county. I believe it would be just the kind of a place I have been wanting to go. I have a quarter section here, but don't like the climate. My wife's health is poor here also. I have two small boys and would like to get a good home. When reading your booklet I found the Umpqua valley to be a favorable place. I can not get away until next fall to look around, and while I am waiting I would like to secure information as to where to go, in order to save time and expense.

I would like a place where I could keep three or four good milk cows, chickens, etc., to raise garden truck and enough feed to feed my stock. I wouldn't mind if one-half was improved and the other half brush. About how much land would I have to support my family and make a fair profit, and what would it cost per acre? If land is cheaper back from town, I wouldn't mind being between eight and twelve miles back. What is the price of milk cows? How many horses does it take on such a farm, and what is the price of them? Would it pay to ship household furniture from here?

Is the land for sale owned by the county or private owners? I don't suppose it would be advisable to sell here before securing land there. Are there other valleys more suitable for my purpose than the Umpqua?

Is there a good market for butter, eggs, pork, garden truck, etc.? If I am an unimproved farm could I get work to make a living the first year? Have had experience on farms, in the woods, and with horses, all kinds of machinery, and also am an engineer. I have life papers. Gravel Business Getting Enormous

REEDSPORT, Ore., May 12.—The Umpqua Gravel company is making a big investment to equip for handling gravel on a large scale. The material will come from Brandy bar, a point about seven miles up the Umpqua river from Reedspport. At East Gardiner the company has built a bunker with a capacity of holding 600 yards of gravel. Four large barges have been purchased from Kross & Banks and the granite from Galle has been brought and the gravel will be barged from Brandy bar to the bunkers. A big bucket and derrick will be used to lift the gravel from the barges to the bunker.

GLASS JARS RECEIVED

Glass fruit jars ordered in anticipation of a heavy canning season have arrived and are being distributed by H. S. French & Co. Three carloads have been received during the past few days and have been divided among local business houses. Because of the prospects of a small amount of fruit coming this year, several of the merchants are considering returning a large amount of the jars, as there is a shortage of storage room and a very small demand for jars.

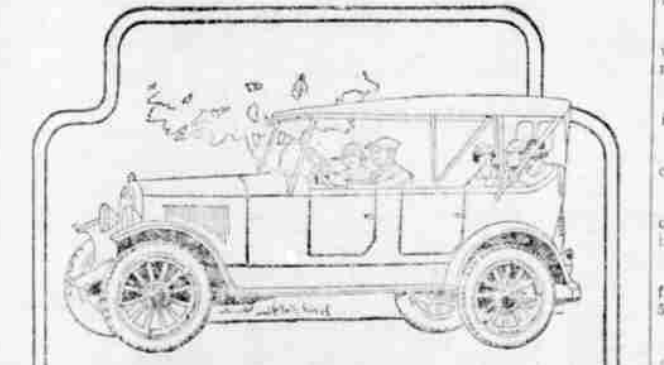
