### Government Make Balloon Tests Speak to Sheep Men on Tuesday

A balloon company enroute from San Francisco to Camp Lewis and the Puget Sound defenses, passed through this city on a special train yesterday. This train, in addition to carrying the men was transporting the complete equipment consisting of balloons, trucks, gas, etc. The company is being dispatched to the sound for the purpose of holding practice with the coast artillery companies to ascertain the true value of aerial observation for directing coast gun fire. At the present time coast artillery stations are only a short distance above sea level and consequently vision is somewhat restricted. With the captive balloons it is believed that better observations can be made and more accurate shooting will result. A series of practice shoots will be held to determine the exact value of the balloons in firing at moving targets at sea.

Prof. O. M. Nelson and County Agent Hurd will address the meeting of sheep breeders at Myrtle Creek on May 18, at 8 o'clock p. m. They will also be at Days Creek on the 19th and Riddle on the 20th. These meetings are held under the auspices of the Douglas County Sheep and Goat Breeders association for the purpose of encouraging the breeding of better sheep and the proper method of preparing the fleece for the market.
