Who Juggled?

To The Republican Voters of Douglas County:

The present County Judge, whose appointment followed the personal recommendation of ex-Judge R. W. Marsters, in a paid advertisement published in the News-Review has attempted, by insinuating to impress you that the discrepancies between accounting officers of this county shown in parallel columns published by me in the News-Review and reprinted in the widely circulated "Primary Nominator" have arisen from a "juggle" of accounts.

The figures and computations published by me were accurately copied from the subscribed reports of the accounting officers of this county, and are true if these reports are correct, and at all times prior to Dec. 31st, 1935, were subject to correction, approval and supervision of the present County Judge. If at this time he recognizes that a "juggle" has been perpetrated, he should have excluded the same prior to the publication of these reports.

My incontroverted statement shows, in part, that the road district fund has been depleted in the following manner:

Failure to make full apportionment	\$11,123.12
Contribution to Pacific Highway	10,000.00
Arbitrary diversion therefrom	14,000.00
Increased expense in and around the courthouse	20,829.78
And I further state that deduction from the road bond fund aggregates	19,000.00
That the General County fund after absorbing transfers of various amounts from other funds was overdrawn	3,117.26
That the general road fund is shown to be so indebted to other funds that at the end of the year it was practically overdrawn.	

All of these transactions occurred near the end of the last calendar year and were approved by the present County Judge, who claims to have acted during his incumbency to the best of his "ability," and herefrom you get the measure of his efficiency, his economy, and attitude toward lateral road improvement. The foregoing condition suggests the pressing necessity of speedy enforcement of the law requiring an annual audit of accounts.

I make no whining or driveling appeal to you for support. I am powerless to "coerce" the exercise of your franchise in my favor, but were I so empowered I would not exercise it.

I have within the means allowed me by law, published for your consideration facts which vitally affect your interests. If they meet your approval, I frankly ask your earnest support at the primary election.

Johnson Record is Great Vote Getter

close to the line and Justice was noted. Meeting the charge that Hiram Johnson was lenient to L. W. W. interests, Judge Goodell referred to the big yard murder when a sheriff of Yolo county and the district attorney were killed by members of that order, and the arrests that followed. Although the exclusive and family were involved with death by dynamite, he insisted that the law take its course and the guilty men be punished severely.

Judge Goodell spoke with an eloquence seldom heard, and as he proceeded to go over the record of the distinguished Californian who appears to the greatest honor in the gift of the American people, his hearers were captivated with his oratory.

Johnson a Favorite. Beginning with the Atlantic states, he speaker spoke briefly of the elections already held. He stated that he Johnson men had no big fund to draw from. The campaign was not sponsored by millionaires, soap manufacturers and others of great wealth. They had no money to pay high priced orators, but the work that had been done was performed by friends of the senator who believed him to be the best man available for president of the United States. In New Jersey no campaigning had been done, and yet Senator Johnson's record was so clear cut in the senate that a part of the New Jersey delegation are Johnson men.

In Michigan some work was done, but the record of the senator in securing return of the Michigan troops from Siberia was not forgotten by that state and in respect and love of the great work accomplished in bringing home the service men Michigan went for Johnson. Indiana was another state where no work was done, and in spite of the fact Johnson secured only two less of the delegates than General Wood secured. The greater part of the delegation will go uncommitted.

In Nebraska, the great corn state, where the farmers were expected to go on record as in favor of the league of nations, the vote was a indication of Johnson policies in his fight in the senate against the league and any entangling alliances. Minnesota, the Dakotas, Montana, and California, who gave the senator the highest majority ever received by any candidate in any state at a primary election, he carrying the day over Hoover by more than 168,000 votes.

The unassisted judgment of Oregon will be accepted gracefully, whether it be for or against Johnson, the speaker alleged, but he did claim that if the voter on next Friday, when alone in the booth at the polls with his ballot and his conscience, votes for the man who has accomplished most for the common people of this country the unassisted judgment of Oregon will be for Hiram Johnson.
