THE WHOLE TRUTH NOTHING BUT TRUTH

Politicians and Supporters are Barred by Law From Spreading "Fake" Propaganda.

PENALTY VERY SEVERE

Last Minute Attacks Must be Based on Facts or a Criminal Label Charge May be Brought Against the Instigator.

During the heat of political campaigns, aspirants to public positions or sometimes their enthusiastic supporters, over step certain bounds in their efforts to defeat their opponents. Last minute "campaign dope" may become boomerangs unless prevention is taken to observe the state law in such regard. It is especially provided that articles shall not be published which are not based on facts or which give only a portion of the facts. These provisions are contained in the corrupt practices act, a section of which reads:

"If any letter, circular, poster, bill, bill publication or postcard shall contain any false statement of charges reflecting on any candidate's character, morality or integrity, the author thereof and every person printing or knowingly assisting in the circulation thereof shall be guilty of political criminal libel, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary for not less than one year nor more than three years."

The statute further requires that if a man be arrested for a violation of this provision of the act and desires to defend against the same by pleading justification, he must show that he personally caused a copy of such alleged libelous publication to be served upon the candidate in person to whom it relates and that he called such candidate's attention particularly to the charges contained therein.

It may be well to call the attention of the public, also, to the fact that the same statute requires all letters, circulars, bills, placards or posters, relating to any election or to any candidate at any election which are circulated at an election, to bear on the face the name and address of the author and publisher thereof. This section has been construed to apply to the circulation of tickets, so-called, that is, placards bearing the names and numbers of candidates. Numbers of these tickets are usually put out, sometimes for the purpose of influencing voters for the candidates thereon, but many times they are circulated without the candidate's knowledge and with intent to injure. The only protection the candidate and the public have in such matters is the protection of this penal statute.

The only purpose in calling attention to these provisions of the law at this time is to inform the public generally, so that no one may transgress the statute.

This grade is seldom given. Miss Denn is a major in the school of music. Miss Smith, who is an English major and an honor student, has an average of 1.2, which is also considered remarkable. The men's average is almost equally good.

Mr. Cossman's average is 1.2. He is a major in the school of education. Mr. Hicks' average is 1.24. All these averages were based upon the grade of the past two terms.

Little Business Before Council

Aside from the discussion of water and light affairs, little business was transacted by the council at its meeting last night. Motorbus licenses were granted J. E. Inman and A. B. Taylor. The application of H. J. Havens was held up for consideration.

The marshal reported that a short stretch of sidewalk in front of the Stagg property in North Roseburg had been constructed at a cost of \$24.48 and this was ordered assessed as a lien against the property. The claim of J. M. Lane for \$16 for labor during the cleanup and Harriet Haldeman for \$15 for typing were allowed and ordered paid.

The plans and specifications for the improvement of N. Jackson street were adopted by resolution and the notice of intention to pave will be published in the near future. The estimated cost of paving this street is \$5265.68.

The ordinance providing for the vacation of Grove St. was read the third time and passed unanimously. The ordinance adopting the street at the former Alexander bridge site was passed and viewers will be appointed and other legal matters given attention.

In adjourning it was voted to meet Monday, May 24, to canvass the vote of the city election and to transact other business which will come up for hearing at that time.
