GREAT FUTURE FOR AIR INDUSTRY

Forest Supervisor Says Service Is Not Discouraged Over Lack of Planes.

MANY ACHIEVEMENTS

People Are Prone to Look Upon the Spectacular Side of the Game and Forget the Important Strides Accomplished.

Forest Supervisor Ramsdell reports that the forest service is not discouraged in its anticipation of great assistance thru airplane patrols in handling the fire situation, although full assistance may not be given this year. Mr. Ramsdell believes that the progress made in the practical use of aircraft has been more remarkable than realized by no average layman.

"Those who have been privileged to witness the work at the training school of an army training field have seen the effects of squadron bombing can best realize why this arm of the military service attained the importance of a separate branch on a par with the infantry, the artillery, etc., in the European armies in the great war," says Mr. Ramsdell.

"We are prone, however, to attach most importance to the spectacular work of the battlefield and the exhibition ground and overlook the fast growing practical achievements of the airship. Locally, there has been considerable interest in aviation through the initiation last summer of an air patrol for forest fires. The results of the first season served chiefly to prove that the work was practical, with immense possibilities for development. The winter was spent in perfecting aerial maps, training observers, wireless phone operators, and securing wireless phones for talking with the ground stations, improving the patrol routes, and other work which would increase manifold the efficiency of the air patrol. Congressional action in reducing the personnel of the army air service to a point where much of the northwest patrol must be abandoned, is not discouraging to those with vision in planning ahead for the certain coming of aero patrol and reconnaissance of the timbered regions of the west, with frequent landing bases. That a landing base must be available at or near Roseburg is a foregone conclusion.

"In a recent number of the Journal of Forestry is an article by Ellwood Wilson, forester to the Laurentide Paper company of Canada, on "The Use of Planes in Forest Mapping." Here is an industrial organization, one of the largest paper pulp producers in the world, which in 1919 utilized two planes in combining fire patrol and mapping work and reported the first season's work a complete success. Western Europe has had established passenger service by air between many cities since the close of the war and this is now accepted without further comment. The postal air routes in the United States are being steadily expanded and commercial passenger and express companies are developing rapidly in the east.

"The centers of population on the Pacific coast are widely separated and travel between them, either by train or boat, is unusually slow. It would be foolish to predict the complete abandonment of our highways for the air, but it is safe to predict that within a very few years, a great north and south line of passenger and express carrying airships for the hurried business trip, the important rush packages, and the ever appearing emergency in sickness and death. The wise communities with strategic locations, such as that of Roseburg, are assuring themselves as stations on the coming aerial highways by providing in these early development days reception fields for the passing ships of the air. Roseburg should secure such a field immediately."

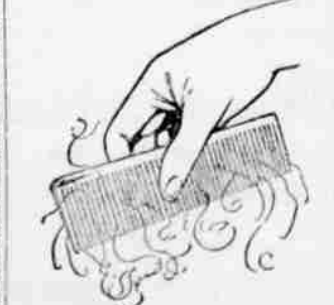

To The Republican Voters of Douglas County:

The present County Judge, whose appointment followed the personal recommendation of ex-Judge R. W. Marsters, in a paid advertisement published in the News-Review has attempted, by innuendo to impress you that the discrepancies between accounting officers of this county shown in parallel columns published by me in the News-Review and reprinted in the widely circulated "Primary Nominator" have arisen from a "juggle" of accounts.

The figures and computations published by me were accurately copied from the subscribed reports of the accounting officers of this county, and are true if these reports are correct, and at all times prior to Dec. 31st, 1919, were subject to correction, approval and supervision of the present County Judge. If at this time he recognizes that a "juggle" has been perpetrated, he should have excluded the same prior to the publication of these reports.

My incontroverted statement shows, in part, that the road district fund has been depleted in the following manner:

Failure to make full apportionment	\$11,120.12
Contribution to Pacific Highway	10,000.00
Arbitrary diversion therefrom	14,000.00
Increased expense in and around the courthouse in 1920 approximates	20,829.78
And I further state that deduction from the road bond fund aggregates	19,000.00
That the General County fund after absorbing transfers of various amounts from other funds was overdrawn	3,117.26
That the general road fund is shown to be so indebted to other funds that at the end of the year it was practically overdrawn.	

Some of these transactions occurred near the end of the last calendar year and were approved by the present County Judge, who claims to have acted during his incumbency to the best of his "ability," and herefrom you get the measure of his efficiency, his economy, and attitude toward lateral road improvement. The foregoing condition suggests the pressing necessity of speedy enforcement of the law requiring an annual audit of accounts.

I make no whining or driveling appeal to you for support. I am powerless to "coerce" the exercise of your franchise in my favor, but were I so empowered I would not exercise it.

I have within the means allowed me by law, published for your consideration facts which vitally affect your interests. If they meet your approval, I frankly ask your earnest support at the primary election.
