Osteopaths Meet Here Today

Meeting of the Willamette Valley osteopathic association was held afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the office of Dr. S. L. DeLapp of this city. The chief speaker will be Dr. C. H. H. of Omaha, Nebraska, who is to be one of the most brilliant in the profession at the time. He was formerly president of the Nebraska and American osteopathic societies, served for two years as a member of the official of the national association, and at present a member of the board of trustees of the Osteopathic Institute of Chicago. Dr. DeLapp will address the doctors at a luncheon at the Umpqua hotel tonight.

In addition to the visiting speaker, Dr. R. M. Roberts spoke on "Some Practical Points in Nose and Throat Troubles." Dr. Sidney DeLapp on "Osteopathic and Surgical Indications in Appendicitis," and Dr. O. A. Waller on "Orthopedic Treatment of the Feet." Among the visiting doctors in attendance are Mary Marshall, A. P. Hoyard and Mary Howells of Albany, Dr. Kent of Brownsville; Dr. Roberts of Corvallis, and several Eugene physicians.

LEGION GAINS 400,000.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 24.—Estimates based on incomplete reports from all parts of the country received here indicated that the American Legion had added between 400,000 and half a million new members to its rolls in the nationwide membership campaign of last week. The final check will be made June 1.

Mr. Byars was elected as state printer in the fall of '81, and moved to Salem the next year, where he since maintained his residence, except for about four years during the administration of Governor Lord, when Mr. Byars was commandant of the Oregon Soldiers' home in this city. Mr. Byars is enjoying a visit with many of the early pioneers of the county, he having served in the same company during the Civil war with several others still here. The Oregon unit was never sent east during the war, but was held in southern Oregon to hold the Indians in check.
