MIKADO SUFFERS COMPLETE COLLAPSE

Mentality is Affected Also, According to Authentic Dispatches.

POLISH FRONT AFLAME

Terrific Fighting Along Ninety Mile Front in Bolshevik Effort to Break Line—Finance Problem Confronts Railways.

HONOLULU, May 24.—That Emperor Yoshihito of Japan has suffered a physical and mental collapse, the disability occurring about April 1, is the statement made in unofficial news dispatches to the Commercial Advertiser here today. The dispatches published are believed to be authentic. The dispatches allege that the emperor is suffering from locomotor ataxia, and that his mentality is affected.

Ninety Mile Battle Line.
WARSAW, May 24.—Bolsheviks attacking the Polish lines along the northern fighting front are going in waves up against the Poles in an attempt to break through and open communication with East Prussia. The fiercest fighting in months is raging along the 90-mile battle line. Villages are changing hands daily as the lines away back and forth over the contested ground.

Problems in Finance.
WASHINGTON, May 24.—The billion and seven hundred million additional revenue which the railroads are hoping to secure through additional rates, does not take into account any increase in wages which the railroad board may grant to the two million railroad employees, in what Howard Elliott, of the Association of Railway Executives, told the Interstate commerce commission today.

Resume Flight.
EUGENE, May 24.—Lieut. R. M. Kelly and Governor Olcott resumed their flight this morning for Stockton, where the Oregon executive will attend the ad men's convention. The flight was interrupted yesterday by heavy head winds.

Would Defeat Smoot.
WASHINGTON, May 24.—Charges that the federal trade commission, investigation of Utah-Idaho Sugar Co., is being used as a club in an effort to defeat him for re-election, were made by Senator Smoot today.

National Forests May Get Bridges

As the Germans retreated their last effort was always directed at the destruction of bridges behind them. The United States army engineers were prepared for this and were supplied with what is known as "fabricated material"—steel girders and trusses all drilled at the factory and ready to be set across the Aisne or the Marne, or whatever river it happened to be, so that the Yank could cross and again close with his foes.

The end of the war came too soon to make it necessary to use all this bridge material, and the bureau of public roads, United States department of agriculture, has its engineers on the problem of adopting the surplus for use in the forest reserves and national parks.

"Fabricated material" means that the parts are ready drilled for connection. This steelwork is in short, easily handled sections—no part weighs over 2555 pounds—and it probably will lend itself as easily to the uses of the summer vacationist as for the hobbled tramp of an armed infantryman moving at doublequick.

Besides 168 spans of drilled material, there is at Camp Humphreys, Va., about 200 tons of unfabricated stuff. This will be examined by experts and much of it will be used in the national forests. A rough estimate places the value of this surplus material at about \$300,000.

Head Winds Force Aviators to Land

SEATTLE, Wash., May 23.—Lieutenant R. M. Kelly and Governor Olcott of Oregon, forced by heavy head winds to land at Camp Lewis, abandoned their effort Sunday to fly by airplane from Blaine to Stockton, Cal. After a three-hour delay they flew to Eugene, Or., from which point they will complete their trip Monday.

Adverse weather conditions hampered the flyers almost from the start. When they hopped off at Blaine at 4:35 o'clock this morning there was only a light wind and the air was clear, but they soon ran into a violent head wind which so retarded their progress that they reached Camp Lewis only with great difficulty.

Although Camp Lewis is only about 150 miles by air from Blaine, they took nearly two hours to make the flight, battling almost constantly with the heavy wind.

They hopped off again from the camp in the middle of a rain storm at 9:30 o'clock, and going through hail, rain and clouds most of the way, flew to Eugene, Or. There it was discovered that the propeller had been damaged by hail, making it impossible to continue their flight until Monday.

They were to have arrived in Stockton coincidentally with the caravan of automobiles that left Blaine a week ago to go to the Pacific Coast Advertising Club's convention in the California city.
