Realty Board Has Meeting

The Roseburg Realty Board met last night in the offices of Lawrence & Cordon, and took up for consideration several important matters which have been pending for some time. The committee appointed some time ago to investigate locations for an independent oil distributing company, brought in its report and stated that a very desirable site north of the city had

been secured. They were instructed to submit the data which they had gathered to several oil companies for their immediate consideration. The realty board also decided to take steps which would result in the re-stocking of the North Umpqua river with silver bass and other varieties of game fish adaptable to warm waters. It was the general opinion that the warm waters were not suitable for trout and that steps should be taken at once to take the matter up with the United States and Oregon game bureaus, in an effort to secure a carload of small fish to distribute in the South Umpqua from Days Creek to the Rose-

burg dam. It is the object of the really board to make the river a real "fishermen's paradise," and to remedy its depleted condition. J. V. Starrett was appointed as a committee of one to push the thing through and secure the carload as soon as possible.

A. V. Schick, of Gerber, California, was present as the guest of the board. Mr. Schick is spending a few days in this city attending to business matters, and is engaged in the real estate business in California. Mr. Schick gave a short talk, complimenting the accomplishments of the board, and telling of real estate conditions in California at the present time. Banker Beals, of Riddle, was also present and spoke on increasing the efficiency of the agricultural portion of Douglas county, especially by more diversified farming.

Foley and Burke to Start Shows Tonight
