\$500,000 ADVANCED BY SOAP MAGNATE
Huge Fund Used For Furthering Candidacy of General Leonard Wood.
W. VIRGINIA PRIMARIES
Howard Leads Wood for Nomination Palmer's Campaign for Sixty Thousand, It is Said.

WHEELING, West Virginia.
WHEELING, May 26.—Returns from yesterday's primary election in West Virginia indicated early this morning that Senator Howard Sutherland continues to lead General Wood for the republican preferential nomination. Only 447 precincts out of the 1869 in the state have been tabulated. The Wood vote at this time stands 68,041, and Sutherland 97,051. There are no democratic candidates on the ballot.

Forming Local Welfare Board
E. M.
