Breezley Approves Tiller Route

Engineer Breezley of the bureau of public roads has recommended that the Tiller Cut-off road be put in condition for travel immediately, according to an official letter received by Supervisor Ramsdell from state headquarters, District Forester Cecil's report to the forestry department at Washington being contained. Engineer Breezley recommends that 3 1/2 miles of new road be constructed and that the remainder of the road be repaired and put in condition to at once bear traffic. This can be done, he estimates, at an expenditure of \$31,176.63. Mr. Breezley in his report states that by the construction of 3 1/2 miles of road and repair of the remaining portion, the route will be put in condition for travel and advises that this be done at once. He also reports on the local demand for the road and the great advantage it will prove during the paving of the Pacific highway.

Twilight League Game Tomorrow

A good game of baseball is expected tomorrow evening when the Christian and Presbyterian teams of the Twilight League meet at the West Roseburg diamond. This game will be hard fought as both teams are going into the contest with a determination to win. Damage Suit Is Heard In Court

A suit for damages was heard in the circuit court today, George W. Platner, of Omaha, claiming that the Stevenson Lumber Corporation of Glendale caused him a great financial loss by the failure to fill a contract for lumber. The defendant alleges that no contract was signed and that the company did not agree to furnish the lumber according to the schedule introduced by the plaintiff. The evidence in the case is chiefly documentary and technical law points are involved. Mr. Platner is the proprietor of four large lumber concerns in Omaha and has been purchasing a large amount of western lumber during the past few years. Attorney B. L. Eddy represents Mr. Platner, and Attorney C. F. Hopkins appears for the defendants.

SECRET IS DISCLOSED.

PHILADELPHIA, May 26.—A trusty American diplomatic secret has been disclosed here through the announcement that Canada soon will send its own minister to Washington. It is that for the past ten years a specially made chair, carved with the Canadian coat of arms, has been waiting in Washington for use of this envoy. Ellihu Root, then secretary of state, ordered the chair, one of many specially designed for the Pan-American union building at the capitol, Andrew Carnegie's memorial to cement more firmly the relations of the Americas. The story is told by Albert Kelsey, of this city, one of the architects of the Pan-American building, who said:

"Once a month the ambassadors and ministers of all the American republics meet and are presided over by our secretary of state in the Pan-American building and each representative has a chair of his own, with the arms of the country carved on the back. "Now when these chairs were decided on, Secretary Root asked me to have an additional one made with the Canadian arms on it, which was done, and which has been hidden for the past ten years, for Secretary Root cautioned me to use his exact words—to be a "little reticent about the matter."

She and the cashier, the wife of the state's attorney for the county, are the only officers. All the directors are women.
