PORTLAND, Or., May 29.—When Portland is host June 20th to 26th to 50,000 or 60,000 people at which time the 46th annual Imperial Council Session of the Mystic Shrine will be held the "glad hand" will be stretched out far and wide. A royal welcome is in store for everyone and Portland is ready and more than willing to care for each man, woman and child.

Examinations For Post Office Clerks

The U. S. civil service commission announces an examination on June 12, 1920, to establish an eligible register from which selections may be made to fill vacancies as they may occur in the positions of clerk and carrier, post office service, Roseburg, Oregon. Salary \$1000 per annum, plus bonus for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1920.

All citizens of the United States who meet the requirements, both men and women, may enter this examination; appointing officers, however, have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Age limits 18 to 45 years on the date of examination. Age limits do not apply to persons entitled to preference on account of military or naval service.
